JUDGE ALLEY.

CHARLOTTETOWN mourns, today, the loss of one of its most prominent and notable citizens, and Queen's County the loss of a learned, careful and just judge. Judge Alley passed away at an early hour this morning. He had been unwell for many months. Indeed he had not been in robust health for upwards of a year. In the course of the winter he suffered a severe attack of influenza, from which he recovered to fall into an anemic condition, under which his life gradually ebbed away. He was the only son of Thomas Alley, Esq., and was born on the 22nd of January, 1844. After a course of study at the Central Academy, he entered the law office of the late Hon. W. H. Pope, afterwards County Judge of Prince George's County. Subsequently he read law with the late John Lawson, Q. C., and the then prominent firm of Haviland & Brecken. He was called to the bar in 1865, and then began a successful legal career. Entering into partnership with Mr. L. H. Davies (now Sir Louis Davies), he continued in active practice until elevated to the Bench when the late Hon. Edward Palmer was made Chief Justice. His ability as a Judge was soon recognized; and he has for many years enjoyed the confidence and respect of litigants in the County Court of Queen's County as well as of the public at large. He had, to an unusual degree, the faculty of taking pains. Every case, even the most trivial, was by him considered in all its bearings. Though personally a man of strong feelings and prejudices, with the friendships and enmities which accompany such a character, the impartiality and justice of his judicial decisions have throughout his career been a subject of remark. Apart from his duties as a judge, he was deeply interested in the history of his native Province. No man in Prince Edward Island was so familiar with the names, biographies, and conditions of those who were prominent among the early settlers of the Province; and he had, by industrious and persistent search, succeeded in collecting and obtaining a large amount of material for the history of the Province which it was his ambition to write. Judge Alley's fraternal and social affections were strong. As a son, brother, husband, father, friend, he was loving, kind, and solicitous. We sympathize particularly with his aged father, his sister, and his son.

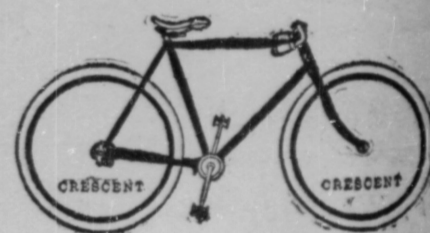
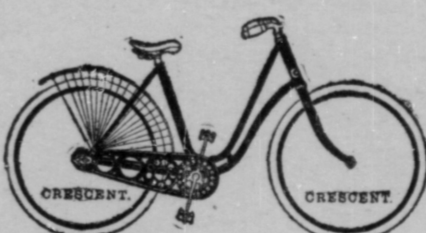
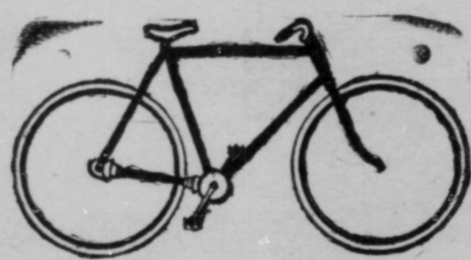
