**Jury Case In Supreme Court**

At the Queen's County sitting of the Supreme Court on Wednesday, with Mr. Justice M.R. McGuigan presiding, the case of Valerius A. MacDonald versus Eric Egan, with Imperial Oil Limited as third party and F. R. McLaine Limited as fourth party was commenced before the following jury: Russell Driscoll (foreman), James O'Donnell, Emmett Wisner, Frank Miller, Albert MacDonald, Tupper Strang, and Russell Roper.  
It is claimed that on December 5, 1956, the plaintiff's truck, driven by his son, was proceeding westward along the Malpeque Road, ahead of it being an Imperial Oil truck, which turned left into the service station of F.R. McLaine Ltd. The defendant was driving along the same road toward Charlottetown, and alleges that, in order to escape the Imperial Oil truck, he had to turn around the rear of it, thus striking the plaintiff's vehicle. Imperial Oil Co. Ltd. alleges that an employee of F.R. McLaine Ltd. was driving the oil truck at the time.  
M. A. Farmer, Q.C., is appearing for the plaintiff; J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C., is for the defendant; Gerald R. Foster and John A. Nicholson for Imperial Oil Limited; and Allison M. Gillis for F.R. McLaine Limited.  
After the examination of five witnesses, the case continues this morning with court meeting at 10:30 a.m.

**Cooler Weather, Rain Brings End To Widespread Heat Wave**

NEW YORK (CP)—Cooler air—land knocked down trees and torrential rains caused some wash-outs in the Templeton, Mass., area. Heavy thunderstorms also were reported in the Worcester, Mass. area and hail fell at Hubbardston, Mass.  
Before the cold front arrived, the mercury soared into the 90s along the east coast as far north as Boston. Philadelphia had a 90 plus reading for the eighth day running, a June record. Newark, N.J., reported a 95 and Norfolk, Va., 96.  
The heat wave and flooding caused by torrential rains took at least 235 lives in the last five days in the eastern United States. The heat deaths, mostly drownings, totalled 207 and another 28 perished in floods.  
Clear weather was the rule in the mid-continent, but many rivers in the plains and upper Mississippi valley still were overflowing their banks because of heavy rains earlier in the week.
