Dior Declares Important Item Was Overlooked

By Nadeane Walker PARIS. (AP)—Christian Dior says that in all the fuss over his shortened skirts an important subject has been overlooked. He's done away with corsets.

"For the first time I have done away with corsets, even for dance dresses," he said in an article for the Paris Presse, an afternoon newspaper. "I have often heard men complain, that in dancing, they couldn't feel a living form under women's corsets."

Dior's shortened skirts caused a sensation in fashion circles last week. He told the Paris newspaper women were already beginning to shorten their hemlines before he decided last May to shorten skirts this fall.

"Revolution was in the air," he said. "I noticed in the streets that women were slyly beginning to shorten their hems."

He guarded his secret by leaving his new creations unhemmed until the last moment. "I told my workrooms to leave the hems alone because I didn't want the secret of the shortening to get out," he added.

Dior claimed also that he had broken with waist seams and cut his dresses in one piece, on princess lines.

"I've wanted to do away with belts for two years, and now I've done it," he said.

But he conceded that fat women had better avoid his ball-skirted "cupola" line.

Heavy Increase Shown In Truck Traffic Ferried

The influence of truck traffic on the Wood Islands ferry service is shown in the figures for the month of July. These show an increase of 123 trucks carried across to Nova Scotia, but there was a corresponding decrease in the number of passenger cars of 174 and another decrease in the number of passengers to 533.

For July, with comparable figures in brackets for the same month last year the totals were: passengers 18,213 (18,745); autos 4,792 (4,966); trucks 1,117 (994).

During the traffic season to date there have been from the first of May to the end of July with 1952 totals in brackets, passengers 34,167 (33,890); autos 9,111 (8,846); trucks 2,879 (2,555).

Since the opening of navigation to the ferries at Wood Islands the increases this year have been 277 for passengers, 265 for autos, and 324 for trucks. Last month there were 613 reservations made while in the same month of last year there were 336, an increase of 277.

Sudden Death Of Brudenell Man

The death of Sidney McLaren occurred suddenly at his home in Brudenell Sunday evening. The deceased was stricken as he was attending the evening work about his farm, and passed away before the arrival of medical assistance.

The deceased, who was in his 73rd year, was born in Brudenell, son of the late William McLaren and Isabel McDougall. He is survived by one son, Athol, at home. His wife, nee Evelyn Bears, predeceased him 14 years ago. A brother James died fourteen years ago.

His remains are resting at the Montague Funeral Parlor until this afternoon when the funeral will be held from the Church of Christ, Montague, at 2:00 p.m. Interment will take place in the Montague Community Cemetery.

Papal Message Delivered Through Cardinal McGuigan

VATICAN CITY. (AP)—The Pope has urged Roman Catholics to extend their fraternity in church to social life.

The Pope made his plea in letters to James Cardinal McGuigan, Archbishop of Toronto, and Paul Cardinal Leger, Archbishop of Montreal, upon the occasion of Canadian Social Weeks whose theme is "the parish as cellular base of social order."

One series of conferences is now being held in English at Antigonish, N. S. A second will be held in French next month at Edmundston, N.B. Catholic social weeks are held to study social problems.

In his letter the Pope called upon Catholics, all classes, "rich and poor, learned and unlearned," to unite upon a plan of Christian equality.

The spirit of the parish, he said, is that of "the peace of Christ that does not tolerate either the impudent contrast of luxury and misery among members of the parochial community, or the hypocrisy of a fraternity in church that does not generate fraternal social relations in labor."

IN MEMORIAM BENJAMIN E. F. WRIGHT

The death occurred at his home in Lower Montague on March 27 of Benjamin E. F. Wright in his 80th year, being one of Lower Montague's oldest and most respected citizens.

Born at West River, P.E.I., the son of Thomas Wright and Ann Irving Wright, he was the last surviving one of a family of seven.

Having followed the sea in early life, he was familiar with the squally rigged ships of that time, and in which he made several crossings of the Atlantic, interesting experiences. Although obtaining captain's papers, he settled in Lower Montague where he engaged in farming up until a few years ago, when the infirmities of old age forced him to retire from taking any continued active part.

He still had a keen interest in anything pertaining to farm life. His wife, (nee) MacFarlane, predeceased him 13 years ago, also three children in infancy. Left to cherish the memory of a kind and loving father is one son Louis on the homestead, Lower Montague, and one daughter, Mrs. W. L. MacEachern, Mermald, P. E. I., also five grand children.

The funeral services which were held March 29, from the Lower Montague United Church, were conducted by pastor Rev. J. M. Fraser, Montague. Burial was in the family plot in the Lower Montague cemetery. Pall bearers were Messrs. Lem Robertson, John Landrigan, Austin Ross, Charles Llewellyn, Ralph Graham and Ellisworth Edmonds.

Maritime Conference Of 7th Day Adventists

PUQUASH, N.S.—"Civilization, according to the Bible, will not commit atomic suicide, for God, not mankind, will wipe clean the slate of international chaos and hatred with a force greater than the atom," declared Evangelist G. D. O'Brien, of Saint John, N. B., in his address to the delegates attending the annual summer Bible conference of Maritime Seventh-day Adventists churches being held this week here at the denominational camp ground.

Representatives numbering almost 500 have come from Adventist churches in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island for ten days of seminars, clinics and workshops in child care, youth training, church leadership and community welfare work. Delegates live in cabins and tents, eat in a modern, well-equipped dining hall and attend sessions in the large canvas pavilion on this beautiful Gulf shore camp site.

Delegates heard J. I. Robinson, of Washington, D.C., associate secretary of the church's Mission Board state that "there is a fellowship among Christians that knows no international boundaries or nationalistic prejudices." Calling for a practical demonstration of the

virtues of the Christian life as the best contribution to a distraught and insecure society he said, "there is no moral power in doubt, but there is great strength in a practical faith that helps our fellow-men."

Pastor W. A. Mercer, of Charlottetown, is the director of the camp pavilion, a member of the prayer committee, and a member of the camp locating committee.

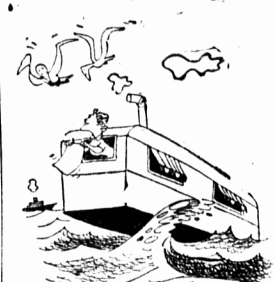
The sessions continue this week closing on Sunday night.

Would Tear Down London Murder House

LONDON. (Reuters) — George Rogers, Labor member of Parliament, is heading a campaign to tear down No. 10 Rillington Place, London's "murder house" where John Christie killed and concealed his wife and five other women. "Short of pulling down the house,

it is hard to see what can be done to stop the people going there," Rogers said Monday. He professed himself "dismayed" by the crowd of sightseers who have been collecting in Rillington Place, many with cameras. "No. 10 stands in a dead end street in the grubby west London tenement district, its curtains drawn. It is for sale. The price is \$5,200." Street-floor windows have been malled down to keep out souvenir-hunters. Christie was hanged last month for his wife's murder. He confessed to killing five other women whose remains were found there.
