

Fear Reds Have Escaped Trap

SAIGON, Indo-China Reuters — French troops continued to close the ring thrown around two Communist Vietnamese divisions, Wednesday but met little resistance and feared the enemy troops had either slipped through the net or "gone to ground."

The 2,000 Communists are on their own ground, and may have infiltrated through the surrounding 10,000 French troops in small groups. They may also have gone to earth in a maze of subterranean hideouts dug under villages and rice fields as they have done in previous attempts to dialogue them.

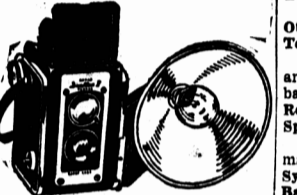
Operation "Camargue" was started Tuesday in the rice-growing area 25 miles north of Hue, on the east coast. It was designed to eliminate the two divisions, which have been giving considerable trouble and have dodged large-scale battle.

Whatever the outcome of the operation, the French are expected to station troops permanently in the district to guard against any further Communist build-up.

Walks 17 1/2 Miles On Thames River

LONDON, (REUTERS) — A man walked for 17 1/2 miles on the surface of the Thames river Saturday. Alexandra Wozniak, a 33-year-old Pole, made the unique down-river hike on a pair of eight-foot plywood water skis he designed and built himself. He propelled himself with cork-tipped ski poles. It took him 4 1/2 hours to cover the distance down the river to Tower Bridge.

Saturday's hike was just a workout for an even bigger jaunt, Aug. 14 Wozniak plans to walk across the English channel on a bigger pair of water skis.

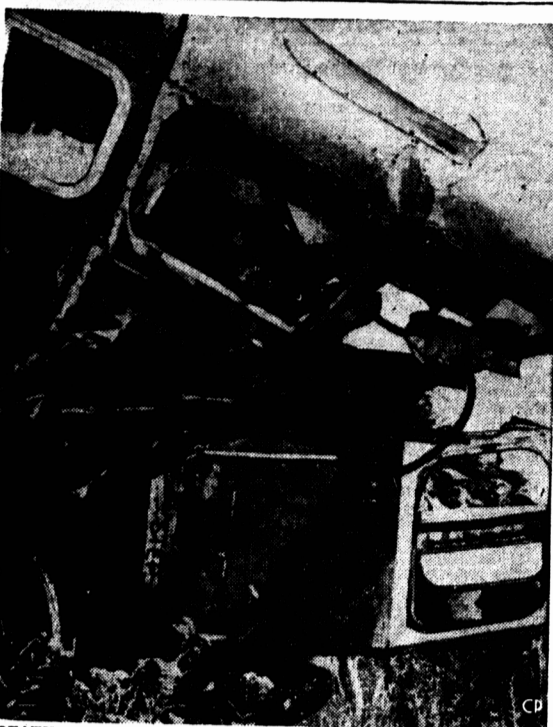
Committed On Theft Charges

CAMP SHILO, Man. (CP)—Capt. Martin F. Smith, 34, of Waterboro, Ont., ordnance officer at Camp Shilo in 1952, was committed Friday for jury trial on charges of theft in connection with disposal of \$30,000 worth of scrap metal at the military camp.

A Brandon scrap dealer was named as the alleged receiver of a large quantity of brass shell casings unaccounted for at the camp.

Smith was arrested at Regina last week and taken to Winnipeg for arraignment. His arrest followed a joint army-R.C.M.P. investigation into suspected irregularities. Smith, still not represented by counsel, chose jury trial at Winnipeg.

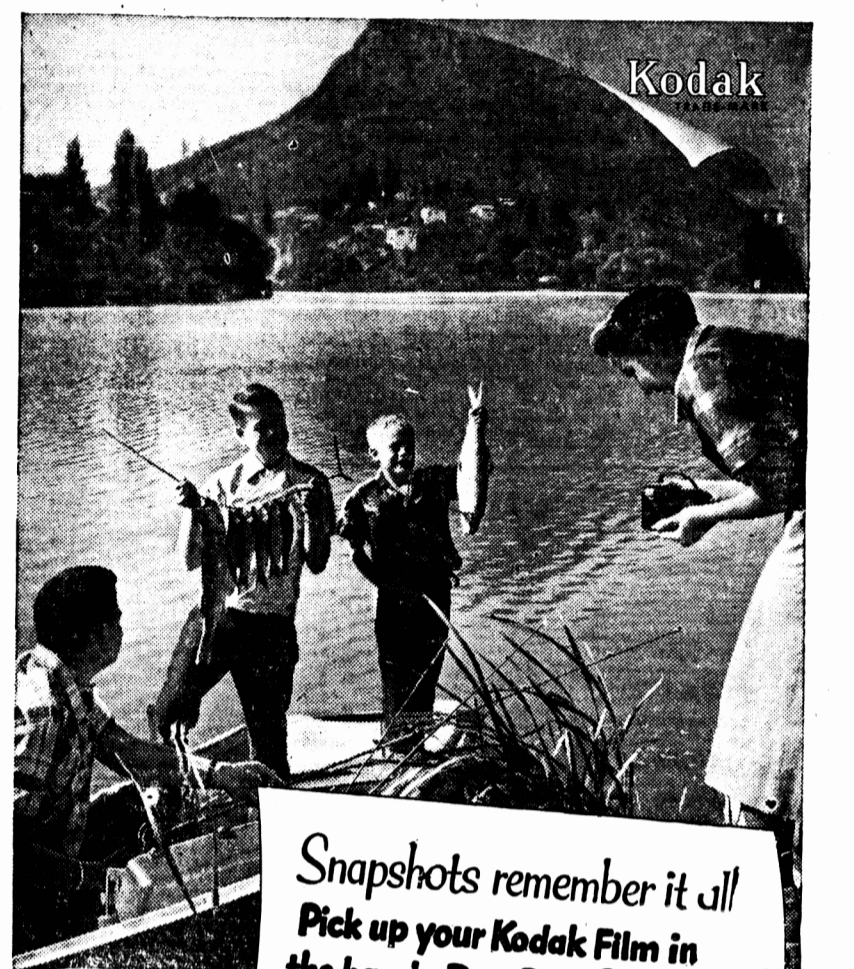

May Be Able To Stay In Canada

HAMILTON, (CP)—Frank Jenisch, a quiet-spoken German sailor who escaped from a prisoner-of-war camp and lived in uncertain freedom for seven years, was released from jail Wednesday. An immigration board will decide whether he will remain in Canada or be deported.

Jenisch, a 50-year-old bachelor and former merchant seaman, was taken into custody by the R.C.M.P. Tuesday. They found him working under an assumed name in a Hamilton farm implement plant as a \$65-a-week toolmaker. He escaped from a prisoner-of-war camp 35 miles east of her July 12, 1946. There were indications that he may be allowed to take out Canadian citizenship papers. The federal government set precedents in 1949 and 1950 when it gave such permission to two other prisoners-of-war—Willy Gottschalk and Hans Albrecht.

Jenisch told immigration officials after his arrest there was nothing he wanted more than to stay in Canada. He said he plans to marry and is "going to try real hard" to become a Canadian citizen. He said in an interview he was "relieved it's all over."
