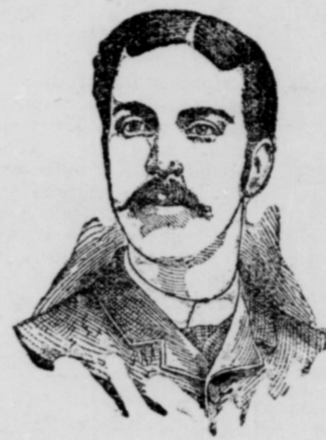

Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, Jan. 29.—10 a. m. Moderate to fresh winds; mostly fair weather.

IN THE FOG.—One man was killed and a dozen injured in a collision between trains on the Brooklyn elevated road in a dense fog Thursday morning. A similar accident in New York resulted in the injury of a number of persons.

A CAPTAIN FINED.—Samuel B. Robbins, master of the steampship Rosignol, of Yarmouth, N. S., has been fined £10 and costs (in all £17 8s) at the Liverpool police court for going to sea on a foreign voyage without having a certificated mate on board.

CHALLENGE CUPS.—Advices from Ottawa state that Lieut.-Col. Irwin has received from London two silver challenge cups, which Lord Lansdowne had presented to the Artillery Association. The cups are to be competed for annually at the dominion artillery meeting.

GOOD WORK.—Since the week of prayer, held in the Cornwall Methodist Church, a remarkable work of grace has been in progress. Between sixty and seventy persons have professed conversion, and the pastor, Rev. D. Davies Moore, is continuing the meetings each night, with unabating interest.

JUBILEE GIFTS.—In addition to the published list of presents received by Dr. Doyle on the occasion of his jubilee celebration, we may mention that he was presented with a handsome silver salad bowl by Senator Howland; beautiful silver salt cellars and spoons by Mr. Hennessey, Fredericton, N. ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—A despatch from Moncton says that Duncan McNutt, an I. C. R. section man, while gunning on Friday accidentally shot himself in the groin. He walked six miles and drove 14 miles to Salisbury, where he took a train for Moncton and arrived there early on Saturday morning, when he received the first medical attendance. He is sinking fast, and recovery is doubtful.

SAD AFFAIR.—A terrible calamity occurred at Delight, Trinity Bay, Nfld., on Tuesday, the 17th, when the house and store of Edward Legge were destroyed by fire, and his two children burnt to death. The poor father and mother are in the greatest grief, and, to add to their misery, they are entirely destitute, as the house and store contained all the winter's provision, and they did not save an article.
