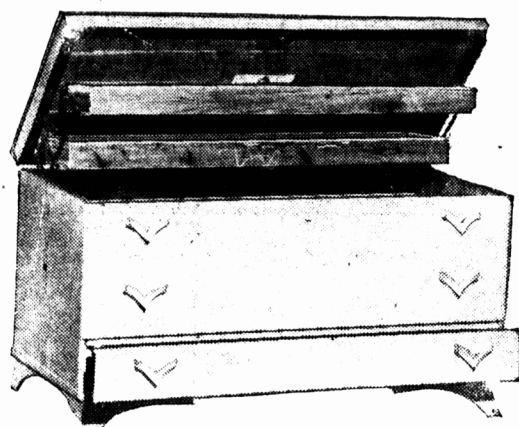

Rewarding the Child
