There is a decided boom in counterfeit fifty-cent pieces in St. John and Halifax. NINEPINS, two large Swings, and lots of fun at the O'Leary Tea, next Wednesday. The Toronto Globe says there is a brisk demand at Toronto for agricultural laborers. SUMMER TRAVEL has begun. Trains and steamers are well supplied with passengers. The indications are that the crops throughout Cape Breton this year will be abundant. THE lobster fishermen on the Cape Breton coast are doing a rushing business this season. ALEX. MCKINNON, Esq., of the Esdale Foundry, has arrived home from Great Britain. NEW CORSETS, new Rubber Circulars, new Summer Wraps, received to-day at Stanley Bros', Brown's Block. MR. A. C. HAMILTON, formerly of the Patriot staff, and recently editor of the Ottawa Free Press, is now engaged in newspaper work in New York. REMEMBER the Sacred Concert in Gospel Army Hall to-night. MITCHELL, of THE EXAMINER staff, leaves this afternoon in the Worcester for Boston, where he intends spending a few holidays. We wish him a pleasant trip. CHARLES E. ROBERTSON, Esq., has purchased the valuable estate of Hon. Senator Hathorne, with crop, stock, &c. The farm (260 acres) will be devoted to stock raising. THE steamer Clifton arrived from Miramichi at 5 a. m. to-day with a part cargo of deals. She sails for London at 10 o'clock to-morrow, with a cargo of potatoes, cattle, &c. By telegram to L. C. Owen, dated Valparaiso, July 4th, the barque Minnie Carmichael, Alex. McLeod, master, was abandoned in a sinking state 29th June, all hands saved. REV. W. B. KING, M. A., conducted the Services at St. Peter's Church yesterday and preached two very able and eloquent sermons, one from the text, "Honor all Men," the other, "He that humbleth himself shall be exalted." Hon. SENATOR HOWLAND and Mrs. Howland arrived home on Saturday. The Senator was detained on the way from Ottawa by the melancholy duty of attending upon a dying brother, whose remains he brought home to be interred at Tignish. JOHN INGS, Esq., and Mrs. Ings left this morning for British Columbia. They go by the Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific Railway—over three thousand miles through Canada. This trip will be long, and we hope it will be pleasant. THE Christian (Baptist) Association will be held at South Lake (East Point) Church, on Sunday next. A large attendance is expected from different parts of the Island, all of whom we have no doubt, will receive hearty welcome from the hospitable people of East Point. AN Ottawa despatch to the St. John Sun says: "David Rogers, D. C. Brown, David McKinnon, Benj. Murphy and J. Lefebvre are appointed inspectors of fish and fishery oil for Prince County, P. E. Island; also board of examiners for candidates for the same." THE second meeting of the Charlottetown Rifle Club, was held at Kensington Rifle Range on Saturday afternoon. The day was a very pleasant one, but unfavorable for good scoring, as the wind was exceedingly changeable, some times from the right and some times from the left. Notwithstanding this, Sergt. Major Grey piled up the handsome total of 60 pts., 7 shots at 200 yds, and 7 shots at 500 yds., carrying off the silver spoon. Brigade Major Irving succeeding in capturing the horn spoon, which he holds till next competition. THE Kentville Star says that another pleasing event transpired in Wolfville yesterday morning—the marriage of John D. Chambers and Miss Fannie Woodman. The bride was the recipient of many handsome presents, among them a beautiful piece of plate from the congregation of the Methodist Church, in which she had filled the position of organist for some time. After the ceremony, the happy couple took the morning express for a tour to St. John, Point Du Chene and Prince Edward Island. Our good wishes follow them. THE FISHERIES.—There are now between sixty and seventy American fishing schooners in the Bay. Mackerel fishing show a decided failure. Some of the seiners went there on the 1st of March and have not yet got one single barrel. Mackerel on the American coast north are exceedingly scarce. Failing to secure any on their own coast, a general rush to the Bay is anticipated, and we would not be surprised to see two or three hundred American seiners off our shores within the next week or so. Capt. Sol Jacobs, of Gloucester, is reported to have already gone home with a full fare. THE STORM.—The storm of last Tuesday night and Wednesday proved most disastrous to the lobster fishing along the North Shore of the Island. Thousands of dollars worth of traps and other gear were destroyed, which will make it difficult to continue the business at many of the canneries any further this season. The tide was the highest known for a number of years, and considerable damage was done to fishing establishments all along the coast. We are sorry to hear this. The lobster industry is of immense value to the people of this Province, and the loss sustained by those engaged in it is to be regretted. THE Critic, one of the Canadian fisheries cruisers, was in Souris on Saturday and Sunday last, having made a trip around the Island a few days previous. The Critic experienced heavy weather off the North Shore on the night of the 29th, and proved herself to be a first class vessel in every respect. The crew speak in the highest terms of her sea-going qualities which were fully put to the test in the storm of Tuesday and Wednesday last. When off East Point the Captain picked up a large seine boat which he towed into Souris. It was found floating bottom up, and is said to belong to a Nova Scotia fishing schooner.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The English Elections. LONDON, July 5. The result of the elections, so far, is as follows: Tories elected, 145; Liberal Unionists, 24; Gladstonians and Parnellites 74. The result proves very disappointing to both sides. The latest returns from many constituencies are exceedingly close and both sides are disappointed, as they fear that the parties will remain in very much the same position they held before, and that a deadlock will ensue. A peculiar feature of the contest is the large number of abstentions from voting, especially on the Liberal side. Gladstone has lost several seats that he fully expected to carry easily. Large numbers of the English Catholics are voting against Gladstone's candidates. Yorkshire is supporting the Premier en masse. The Liberals have won Scarborough, West Nottingham and Huddersfield, but have lost Boston, Grantham, three Birmingham seats and Ashton-under-Tyne. The Gladstone candidates had an increased majority in Dundee, which is looked upon by Gladstonians as a very hopeful sign for their complete triumph in Scotland. The "Grand Old Man" himself has been elected for Leith as well as in Mellothian. He ran in Leith to punish a scoundrel named Jacks who promised to support the Home Rule Bill and failed to do so. Jacks had over three thousand majority at the last election, and no one could be got to oppose him. At last the Premier himself determined to run when Jacks immediately withdrew from the contest and Gladstone was returned unopposed, thus gaining a seat. The Home Rulers say that Gladstone's strength lies in the counties, and they have yet to be heard from. Three More Fishery Seizures. HALIFAX, July 5. Reports from Shelburne of the seizure of three more American fishing schooners at that place have produced a big sensation. As before reported, the schr. City Point was formally seized on Friday. On that day the schrs. C. B. Harrington and Geo. W. Cushing, also from Portland, Me., put into Shelburne Harbor to purchase bait, and the captain and part of the crew of each vessel went ashore before reporting at the Custom House. Commander Quigley, of the cruiser Terror, paid them a midnight visit, and the captains frankly admitting that they had been ashore and had not entered at the Custom House, he thereupon seized them. The vessels are all partially owned by one man, and the three are anchored side by side under the bows of the Terror, which is thus proving herself to be something more than a mere empty name. They are held for the present for violating the Customs laws of the Dominion. Reports from the north side of Prince Edward Island say that a large American fleet is engaged in fishing inshore there, and cutters are not sent. The fishing schr. Gloucester, hereward, narrowly escaped seizure at Canso on Saturday.

THE fact that the temperance people in only a few of the counties in which the Scott Act has been adopted, have been able to secure a vote of the County Councils favorable to the appointment of a Police Magistrate, proves that they have not exercised that active influence in municipal contests which the terms of their platform of last September would suggest. This is not necessarily an evidence of a weakened temperance sentiment, although every one of these councils was elected subsequently to the adoption of the Act. It proves simply a failure of activity on the part of the friends of the law, and incidentally tends to bring the law into disrepute.—Toronto Globe.
