

# Plowing Match Fair Set for Dundas Today

The 22nd Dundas Plowing Match and provincial fair will be officially opened today at 2 p.m. by Lieutenant-Governor F. W. Rossman.

This old fashioned type fair has developed into one of the major agricultural attractions in the province and it is expected that an even larger crowd will be in attendance this year.

The fair will include livestock and poultry classes, handicrafts, flowers, roots, vegetables, home cooking as well as other classes. Also being held is a horse show which always attracts major interest.

Six plowing events will take place today and will include gang plow and tractor classes. The Kings County championship class will take place on Thursday and the winners of this event will have the privilege of representing Kings County at the provincial match being held at O'Leary later this fall.

Plowing classes commence this morning at 10 a.m. Livestock judging begins at noon with the horse classes beginning at 1 p.m. All dairy and beef classes will remain on the grounds for both days so that visitors will not miss the opportunity of viewing them.

This year \$60 has been donated as a special prize for the Aberdeen Angus breed. This donation is from the Aberdeen Angus building where displays of handicraft, home cooking, flowers, roots and vegetables will be judged.

All the usual attractions that go with this fair will again be in evidence, and will include sports, Scottish dancing, sports and other amusements.

The ladies will be especially interested in the home economics building where displays of handicraft, home cooking, flowers, roots and vegetables will be judged.

Lunches and meals will be available.

## Un. Work Complaints May Result In Action

Attorney-General Melvin McQuid said yesterday he is prepared to investigate any complaints received on violations of the Lord's Day Act in this province.

Men of the Island Presbytery of the United Church in conference Sunday expressed concern over firms in the province who continue to work on Sunday.

Men of the presbytery are pressing plant at New Annan and some contracting jobs in Summerside. Hope was expressed at the conference that the attorney-general would look into the matter.

"Sunday work," said Mr. McQuid, "is a widespread problem in Canada and was discussed at the recent premiers' conference in Victoria. The problem is particularly acute in large industrial areas and in the pulp and paper industry in New Brunswick."

According to the Lord's Day Act, persons are prohibited from carrying on their ordinary occupations on Sunday. It is a very difficult situation to handle and do justice to all. Some people feel that any kind of work should not be tolerated while others feel that some kinds of work are necessary."

Mr. McQuid said that in a complaint will be looked into by his department "and I am prepared to meet with the people who feel the law is being broken to discuss the matter."

The attorney-general added that this is the first indication he has had that such a problem exists in this province.

## Legal Advice Is Sought By Potato Bd.

Legal advice is being obtained by the provincial government in drawing up regulations which will allow the potato marketing board to collect a levy on potatoes shipped out of the province.

This summer, a magistrate ruled that the board did not have the power to charge one cent per hundred pounds on a shipped potato. Revenue raised in this way went to finance board activities.

Acting premier A. D. MacRae said yesterday that the government would like to have the board maintained as it is valuable to the potato industry.

He said that lawyers are organizing the regulations which will be presented to the Executive Council for consideration and approval.

## Salt Water Fish Business Operates On Prairie Lake

**WATROUS, Sask. (CP) —** A shrimp boat of five has been bobbing across the salty waters of Little Manitou Lake near here this summer while the material for a new Prairie industry.

Hundreds of miles inland, the 13-mile-long lake and its east coast Saskatchewan town are the scene of brine shrimp fishing and packaging operations.

They are used as food for human consumption. Resembling in size and shape the thick end of a toothpick, they are one-half inch long at the end of their 18-month-long life cycle.

The fish harvest has been expected for the first time this summer, by the newly formed Watrous Brine Shrimp Company which has fishing rights for 10 years.

Frank Debeve, manager of the company, said Little Manitou is one of two salt water lakes in North America with enough shrimp to make a commercial enterprise possible. He described the salt water as being the most abundantly endowed in the world.

The shrimp catch is brought to the company's plant here, packaged in plastic and quick-frozen for shipment to world markets.

The other parts of the company's operation is the gathering of brine shrimp eggs which are scooped from the shore where an on-shore breeze has piled them.

There is no natural sand at Manitou and visitors who have thought they were walking on shells were actually treading on billions of shrimp eggs which lie up to five inches deep.

Shovelled into sacks and aged for two months, they are then used as fertilizer.

## HIGHWAYS SIGNS SAID FAULTY

A traffic sign east of the Red Bridge at Wilcox, notifies travelers to turn left 300 yards beyond in order to get to Summerside. If a motorist obeyed he would end up in Bedeque Bay after a rough ride over very uneven terrain. The actual distance is one mile. Another misplaced sign that was incorrect by several hundred yards, has been taken down from its former location between Bordertown and Albany Corner.

Jeffers, Chief Sachem of the Wampanoag Indians of Massachusetts, said Tuesday the purpose of the league is to promote better understanding of the Indians, their culture and their problems.

hibit any future British trade agreements with the Commonwealth.

Diefenbaker asked pointedly: "What has happened since then to bring about such a change in British government policy on such a fundamental issue?"

Prime Minister Holoake of New Zealand — the Commonwealth country with the most at stake — told the conference the absence of adequate safeguards would mean nothing short of economic collapse.

**ASSURANCES VAGUE**

Holoake, echoing a point made by Diefenbaker, expressed worry over the vagueness of Common Market assurance so far on agricultural exports and urged specific commodity marketing agreements.

Pakistan's President Ayub Khan, first leader of the Commonwealth's "developing" countries to speak, attack what he described as an uncompromising attitude by the Common Market at the Brussels bargaining table. He said the six always seemed to resolve any conflict of trade interests in their own favor.

The West had to choose between helping the developing countries to stand on their own feet or leaving them in the role of feeding the West's factories with raw materials, Ayub said. If that happened it would be "imperialism of the worst kind."

Prime Minister Nehru of India questioned the assumption that a united Europe is necessary. Nehru, with a declared policy of non-alignment with East or West, said the emergence of a united Europe might

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacIsaac yesterday committed potato dealers who have advised growers that potatoes in used bags will not be accepted by dealers.

The move was made in an attempt to reduce the use of potato disease. Used bags have been known to spread the disease.

Considering the volume of potatoes handled by the dealers, MacIsaac said it is important that they be the ones who keep a careful check on potato bags.

"I would also like to add that any grower who ships potatoes in used bags will be considered in the future in potato bags that can only be used once and which will not return to the province."
