REV. WILLIAM A. THOMSON

(An appreciation by Rev. G. M. Young, D. D.)

In the passing of Rev. William A. Thomson, at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, on April 16, 1939, a life of singular sweetness and usefulness was ended.

Beginning with great promise, his day of life was clouded by sore affliction before its meridian height had come, and the long afternoon was filled with weary years of pain and weakness. Gifted intellect, above the ordinary, he first sought expression in the teaching profession, but his success there added point to the pressure of church leaders to enlist his services in a wider field. Divine compulsion he yielded himself, and for a quarter of a century was a good minister of Jesus Christ in the active work in the Maritime Provinces. His sensitive nature, his spiritual perception, his kindly heart, endeared him to the congregations he served for long years. His name will be cherished by those whose homes have been brightened, whose lives have been lightened, by the cheerfulness and knightly qualities of his rich and noble ministry.

Before he reached the summit of his powers he was laid aside by illness, and for another quarter of a century probed once more that out of great tribulation a man may wash his robes and make them white in the blood of the Lamb. From his sick room through all the years, a ministry of courage and consolation exercised its beneficent influence. For all of us the life of such a man has precious lessons. His work is done, but the truth he preached, the light to which he pointed, the life he proclaimed, abide. We shall not forget his untiring service, his faithfulness, his beautiful humility, his brotherly sympathy, his unselfish nature. "The memory of the just is blessed."

Profound sympathy goes out to his widow in Charlottetown and his three daughters, Mrs. Percy Keeping, Kentville, N. S., Mrs. (Rev.) B. E. Newnam, Southampton, Ont., and Mrs. J. A. Russell, Toronto, Ont.

(The above appreciation appeared in the "New Outlook," United Church paper, Rev. Dr. Young, some years ago, was minister of the then Methodist brick church (now the United Church) in Charlottetown.)
