Crop Outlook Still Favorable

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's crop outlook remains favorable in the Prairie provinces but rain is urgently needed in some areas of Saskatchewan and Alberta, the bureau of statistics reported today.

In the seventh of its 1957 series of reports covering Prairie crop conditions — based on telegraphic reports received Tuesday night from field correspondents — the bureau said the rain-deficient areas are in west-central and north-western Saskatchewan and adjacent portions of east central and northeastern Alberta.

HMCS Sioux Sails For East Coast

VICTORIA (CP)—HMCS Sioux, veteran of 12 years with the Pacific Command, left here Tuesday to join the navy's Atlantic Command.

The Sioux, under Cmdr. Peter G. Chance, will reach her East Coast base, via the Panama Canal, Aug. 5.

Majority of the fleet "V" class destroyer's company will transfer to the H.M.C.S. Margaree, a new anti-submarine destroyer escort

scheduled for commissioning in Halifax this fall. The Margaree will join the Pacific Command after commissioning.

The Sioux was built in 1943 for the Royal Navy and transferred to the RCN March 5, 1944.

During the war, the Sioux was in many engagements with enemy units, particularly off the Norwegian coast and in the English Channel.

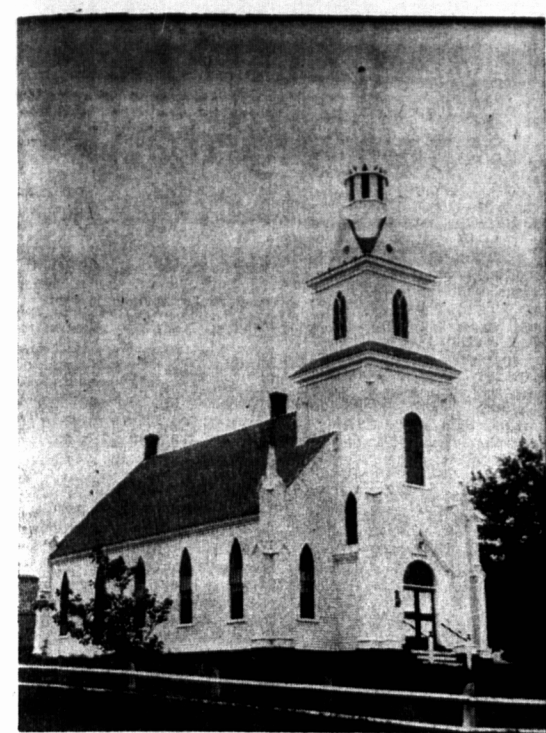

Will Dedicate Stained Glass Window At St. Peter's Bay

An impressive dedication ceremony will take place this Sunday at 2:30 p.m. at St. Peter's Bay United Church with the unveiling of a magnificent stained glass window.

The subject of this memorial window is "The Good Shepherd." The predominant color is ruby red, this colour being used for the outer robes of the Christ figure, with the undergarments being white.

The figure stands in front of a brownish-grey fence with green foliage at its base. Colored flowers are interspersed among the foliage. The sky is of blue glass, and the window is completely made of antique glass considered to be of a superior quality. The overall size is 3 feet by 8 feet and it is finished with a Gothic top.

This beautiful memorial was donated by Robert M. MacEwen in memory of his parents, Adolphus and Jessie (Hayden) MacEwen and family.

Mr. MacEwen is one of the many successful Islanders abroad, being a contractor and builder in the United States. He was born at St. Peter's Bay and spent his boy-
