

New Look Only Double Winner In Races Under Lights Saturday Night

New Look, the pacing son of Simcoe Harvester showed a return to his old time form Saturday night as he easily won two dashes at the Provincial Exhibition track. He paced the first mile in 2:13 the fastest time of the night.

The meet held before a large crowd of fans, was well marked with upsets from the first heat when Marion E came pacing some until the last when Len O'Meara drove big Babe Britton to an easy win. Other winners were Milldale, Nell Kalmuck, Dot Budlong, and Baron.

New Look owned and driven by James McGregor won both heats with plenty to spare. Driver McGregor took New Look up from sixth place at the half both times and went out to front near the top of the back stretch. Billy Conn finished second in the first race and Alan Mac came second in the next dash.

Willard Kelly drove Nell Kalmuck to victory in the first dash for trotters and pacers. Nell went most of the mile in third position and beat off a stretch drive by Babe Britton. Len O'Meara took Babe Britton up from fifth place at the half in the last race. The big bay mare paced beautifully around the outside of the field and came home about two and a half lengths ahead of the other horses.

Marion E, a pacing bay mare made her first racing a winning one. Driver Willard Kelly held her in second position for five eighths of the mile before opening up a long lead. Prince Marine finished a close second with a strong stretch drive. Dot Budlong got away to the top and stayed there. Marion E and Prince Marine finished a close second and third but they could not overtake the little mare owned and driven by Murdoch Nicholson.

Milldale won the second race on the card after a stirring stretch battle with Jimmie A. The Baron pulled an upset in the sixth race when he trotted some a winner ahead of Milldale and Winnie's last.

The daily double paid \$31.20. The daily double winners were Milldale and New Look.

Congratulations are due today to the Summerside Midgets, Bantams and Pee-Wees who won Provincial baseball titles Saturday by defeating teams from Charlottetown. The City boys are also deserving of congratulations for although they didn't win they fought their hardest and took their setbacks like true sportsmen.

Each team had its small share of supporters to cheer them on to victory Saturday. The young fellows showed lots of hustle and when each inning was completed they ran to and from the field to the dugouts like major leaguers. Their fielding plays in most cases were good and the midgets in particular showed that in a few years they will be able to step into junior ball and give a good account of themselves.

Deserving of special mention is young Roger MacLeod of Charlottetown who pitched fourteen innings of ball for the Pee-Wees. Roger struck out 26 men during the afternoon and surrendered only five hits. In the first game, the only one which Charlottetown won, he gave up only one hit. He is a brother of "Duck" MacLeod, 14-year-old shortstop on the Charlottetown juniors. Roger shows lots of promise as a pitcher but two many doubleheaders on an afternoon could cut short his future stardom.

There were plenty of other stars Saturday afternoon, among them Johnny Squarebriggs, the son of the former hockey star, Johnny Squarebriggs, and young Harris of Summerside, the son of Allie Harris who is one of the leading bowlers in the western capital. Squarebriggs and Harris are pitchers and hooked up in a neat duel in the Midget game.

Don Cameron of Summerside showed plenty of batting power in the midget game when he blasted a long triple in the fifth inning. During the seven innings they played the midgets committed only three errors, two of them being out-pitchers throws to first and the other an overthrow to first on a hard hit ground ball.

And although the City Bantams took a bad beating, they too provided their supporters with plenty to cheer about. "Smelt" Gillis batted out two hits, Jackie Kane was on his toes at shortstop and young Whelan scored two runs to lead his team in that department. The Summerside boys were not slow to give much credit for their victories to their instructor "Chick" Whelan, who they stated taught them many of the finer points of the game such as base stealing, sliding and the use of signs.

The weather yesterday spoiled the afternoon of many local ball fans who were banking on witnessing a thrilling doubleheader between the Summerside and Charlottetown intermediates and juniors. The Junior Abies were going all out to make the game as good as possible and Saturday evening about ten of the players raked off the diamond and rolled it to have it in top shape for the game.

College Boy Wins Golf Title

BETHLEHEM, Pa., Sept. 16—(AP)—Billy Maxwell, poker-faced 22-year-old college boy from Odesa, Tex., chopped down giant-killer Joe Gagliardi with a relentless streak of par golf Saturday and became the youngest player since the great Bobby Jones to win the United States amateur championship.

The stocky, imperturbable red-head, deadly with his irons, defeated the 30-year-old Mamoroneck, N. Y., barrister 4 and 3 in their 36-hole finals over the water-soaked Saucony Valley course.

Jones was 22 when he won the first of his five amateur titles at Merion in 1924. But the youngest man to capture this championship was Robert Gardner, who did it at 19 in 1909.

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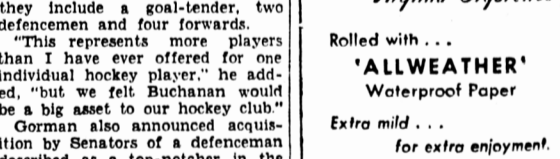
