Report Of S'ide Police Department

The following is the report of the Summerside Police Department submitted at the last regular meeting of the Council on Monday evening by Councillor Clarence Steel. This report covers the month of April:

Intoxicated condition: 25 cases, 24 convictions, 1 dismissed; vagrancy, 1 case, 1 conviction; Assault: 2 cases, 1 conviction, 1 dismissed. Occasioning bodily harm: 2 cases, 2 convictions. Ability to drive impaired: 2 cases, 2 convictions. Damaging property: 2 cases, 2 withdrawn.

Obstructing police officer: 2 cases, 2 convictions. Illegal possession liquor: 2 cases, 2 convictions; vagrancy town by-law: 7 cases, 7 convictions. Parking town by-law: 12 cases, 12 convictions.

Fines and costs collected: \$958.50. This includes fines on over-parking time: dog licenses collected, \$27.00; bicycle, \$48.00; miscellaneous, \$142.00; building permits, \$7.00; parking meter collections, \$218.22.

The report, which was prepared by the Chief of Police Peter White, stated: "I might state that on receiving a number of complaints from citizens in regard to the percentage of butter fat contained in the milk supplied to the town I had a sample of milk taken from each vendor taken to Charlottetown to the Public Health Department for examination. We received from that department a report on the bacterial contents, etc., but were informed that the Department of Agriculture handles all samples in regard to butter fat content, so we will be taking a further sample for that department. The Public Health Department now have a men who, I am informed, inspects all dairies every week.

"I wish to bring to your attention that practically all necessary stop signs have now been placed and a much more substantial post has been placed instead of the flimsy one previously erected, which also has a much better appearance.

"The street signs which are in storage in the town buildings have not as yet been put in place on street intersections. This I would recommend be attended to as soon as possible.

"The police work seems to have been increasing steadily for the last few years and as an example in April, 1951, we had 25 cases before the courts while the present report shows 57. This is over double and will let the Council see for themselves as we are carrying on with the same number of men. The amount of fines has also doubled for the same month."
