FARM WEEK

The Junior Farmers and 4-H Club members of the province had an opportunity to participate in many of the interesting features of the opening programme. Over seventy boys and girls competed for the Centennial Farm Week King and Queen. The crowning ceremonies took place at the Experimental Farm prior to the Parade through the city streets. To-day's events will be featuring Horticulture and Field Crops. Many interesting features will be demonstrated.

Thursday is Livestock and Poultry Day. In the morning there will be a very interesting feature. There will be a live class of market hogs, which the people will have an opportunity to judge and score. Later these hogs will be slaughtered and the carcasses rail-graded and hung, so that the people will have an opportunity of comparing their original placings with that of the final grading.

There will be demonstrations of type classification, butter fat testing, feet trimming of cattle. At the Advanced Registry Station there will be a beef of a hog, which will be chalked off showing the various cuts of beef and pork. Above these animals will be a chart also depicting the various cuts.

There will be an opportunity to view the various types of poultry houses and the different types of ventilating systems used. To climax the Centennial Farm Week celebrations, we are holding a mammoth Chicken Bar-B-Q, which will commence at 5:00 p.m. Daylight Time, at the Experimental Farm. Provisions are being made for 2,000 servings.

## CHICKEN BAR-B-Q

While you will have an opportunity to taste the delicious and produced chicken at the Bar-B-Q, why not try some at the beach or in your back yard. As a matter of fact, it is very easy to prepare in your own kitchen. The following gives you a few hints on the know-how:

## PREPARING THE CHICKEN

Young chickens weighing from 2 to 3 pounds, dressed but not drawn, are most satisfactory. The legs and head are removed and the backbone is cut by running a heavy short-bladed knife or linoleum knife, through the ribs and the hips on each side at a distance of about 1/4 inch from the centre line. All the ribs are thus severed from the backbone and, if care is taken not to cut too deeply, the intestines will not be punctured. Cutting continues around the vent, and the backbones with tail and neck attached is removed. With the carcass thus split wide open, the entrails can be removed easily. It is important that the lungs be removed. A slight cut is now made from the inner side in the middle of the breast, extending back the sides to separate the meat from the breast bone. The fingers before lifting out the breast bone and the cartilage at its forward end. A cut with an ordinary knife along where the keelbone has been removed, will now divide the carcass into halves. Sometimes the wing tips are removed.

## TO BARBECUE CHICKENS

It takes approximately 25 to 45 minutes to barbecue a 2 1/2 pound chicken split in half. Dip the chicken in barbecue sauce before placing it over heat.

Turn and brush the chicken every 4 or 5 minutes with a barbecue sauce. Watch the chickens closely to avoid burning the skin. Use picnic forks with handles 3/4 feet long. Apply the sauce with pastry brushes to which handles have been attached. Keep pieces of chicken either skin side up or cut side up; otherwise it is difficult to tell when they are all turned. The secret of good barbecue chicken is low, even heat, frequent turning and basting to avoid burning. Barbecue pits may be made circular, rectangular, or by digging a hole in the ground. The pits are generally made by using building blocks, bricks, or stone and are about 2 feet high.

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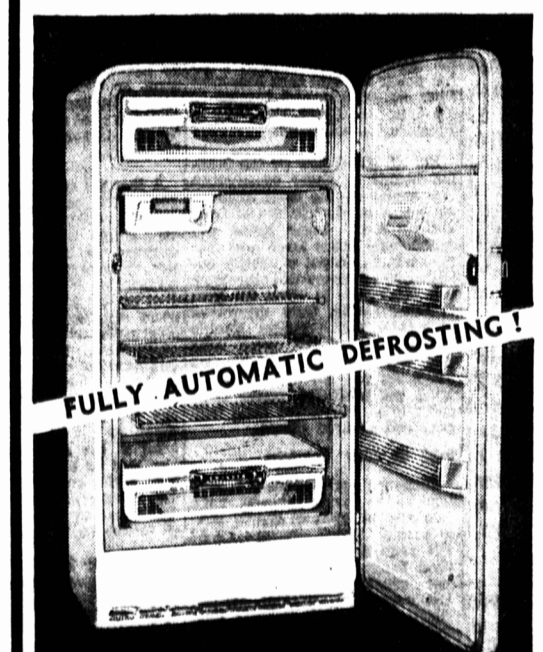
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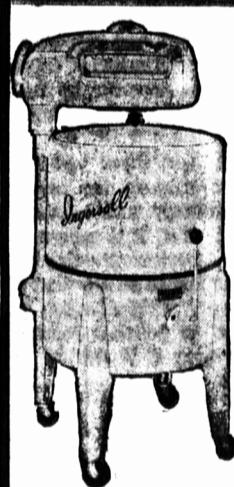
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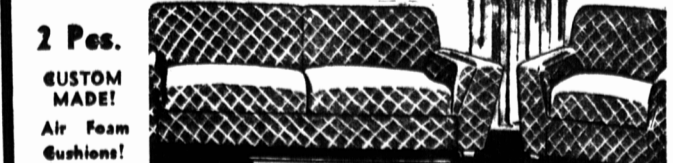
