### Medical Missionary Speaks at Baptist Women's Rally

A large gathering at the First Baptist Church Thursday evening listened to a noted Baptist medical missionary, Dr. Dorothy Timpany, of Victoria, Krishna, district, India, recount some of her experiences in that country as a doctor, missionary and hospital administrator. The occasion was a provincial rally of the Baptist Women's Missionary Union.

She comes of a great missionary family. Her father, Dr. Clark Timpany, now retired and living in India, is a nephew of a pioneer missionary, Rev. A.W. Timpany, who with his wife went to India 36 years ago. Dr. Dorothy Timpany was born in Ontario and received her early education at the boarding school for mission girls' children at Madakal. Later she attended high school in Los Angeles, Calif. and Albany and Edinburgh, Scotland.

Feeling called to missionary service in India particularly in the medical field, she entered Western University for her degree in medicine and graduated in 1927. She entered in 1928 Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton and later studied in London, England and Edinburgh, Scotland. She began her missionary service with the Canadian Baptist Mission in India in 1929. Over the years she was stationed at various posts and in 1935 took charge of Bethel Hospital in Victoria.

Besides practising medicine Dr. Timpany's life is a very busy one as she is a teacher, counsellor and supervisor. She instructs student nurses, administers the business of the hospital and give leadership and advice.

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### CAC President Outlines Projects

"The Consumers' Association of Canada is stronger than ever," stated Mrs. Lorne MacLellan, who is president of the P.E.I. organization at Thursday's meeting held at the YMCA. "The opinions of CAC are on the front pages of daily papers—we are no longer struggling to become known," continued Mrs. MacLellan, in a statement to the members and guests and brought them up to date on the newest CAC project.

Guest speaker for the evening was Mrs. Malcolm Putnam who demonstrated the art of linoleum block printing.

Mrs. Ian MacLeod spoke on "Pesticides and drugs" and Mrs. William Hogg's topic was "Credit Buying." Both of these talks contained valuable information for consumers.

The president outlined a full attendance of members at January's meeting, and asked that they interested other women to join the organization. The annual membership fee of \$9.00 includes a subscription to the consumer bulletin whose six issues each year provide a reliable buying guide for consumers.

To the extent of having a survey made find out what things are being done by nurses that should be done by less highly trained people on smaller salaries. Miss Collicutt was thanked for her talk by Mrs. Alexander MacKay. A motion was passed that the blood pressure machine be purchased by the Kensington Hospital Auxiliary.

The president read a letter from the business manager of the Prince County Hospital, thanking the Kensington Aid for buying a four seater for the lobby, a desk appearing the purchase of other pieces by other groups. She also read a letter of appreciation for equipment donated to the Prince County Hospital Annex.

### MARY HAWORTH Reader Avoids Medical Advice About Sore Lip

Dear Mary Haworth: I started smoking cigarettes when I was a girl 16 years ago. I am now 25. I smoked unfiltered cigarettes which burned my lower lip so much that I now have an ugly red spot right in the center.

Lipstick won't cover it and the more lipstick I use, the worse it looks. It also feels very sore when I drink coffee or eat hot foods. I have tried every remedy I can think of, but nothing helps it.

I stopped smoking two years ago but the sore remains. Do you suppose I have cancer of the lip? I am so conscious of the thing that I shrink from people, fearful that they may comment on it. Please help me some one or some way to cure this burn. Yours truly, V.B.

Dear V.B.: I gather you feel financially unable to get involved in first class medical treatment at prevailing prices. I can't imagine any other reason why you would hang back, neglecting to see a good doctor about this painful ailment, whatever it is.

My advice is to go at once to the outpatient clinic of any of the several hospitals in the town from which you write, and stubbornly, patiently, hopefully insist that somebody there tell you where to apply for the medical aid you need.

It is possible that this is cancer of the lip. If so, surgery would be indicated. And the delay is worse than the disease itself, in cases of cancer - "if you ever do it, do it quickly, surgical repair" work of this kind is a matter of life or death. So get it done on M.H.
