

Proposed Amendment To Zoning Law Is Defeated

A resolution submitted by Councillor H. E. Hyndman, re the amendment of city zoning by-laws concerning the erection of certain buildings in the Ward 5 area, was killed by City Council yesterday.

The objection to the construction of multi-family building in the area bordering Highland Avenue and North River Road was raised by residents of the area, prompting Councillor Hyndman to submit the resolution.

However, Councillor Gerald Foster raised some objection to the amendment saying that the resolution was directed at just one man. No party was named in the matter.

Brief outline of the area involved, illustrated in map form, was submitted by Colonel F. J. Storey, chairman of the Town Planning Committee.

It was resolved that the proposal of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation to pay the 1958 taxes at full rate on its housing property be accepted and that the assessor be instructed to advise of assessable values accordingly.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS
Other resolutions passed during

the three-hour session included one authorizing the fire department to add five men to the strength of the hose company to take care of the enlarged area of the city. It was also noted that these new recruits would be accepted from the Ward Six fire-hall.

Tenders will be called in the near future for the laying of approximately one-half mile of concrete sidewalk in Ward Six along the north side of Kirkwood Drive from Malpeque Road to the school. The resolution was submitted by Councillor F. B. O'Neill.

Other tenders called for via resolution included the acquisition of a deluge gun for the fire department to replace one damaged in Market Building fire.

Tenders accepted were for the purchase of an aluminum extension ladder from LaFrance Fire Engine and Foamite Ltd.; the purchase of one Baker two-stream cellar pipe nozzle from the same firm; and the purchase of a slow battery charger with thermostat control from Batt and MacRae, Ltd.

City Clerk John Bulter was authorized to purchase four man-

hole rings from Hall and Stavert, Limited and the necessary reinf. forcing iron as per submitted, from W. H. Crandall, Associates.

WARM APPRECIATION
The Council went on record as voicing its warm appreciation to the Government of the Province for the recent grant extended to the City along with other municipalities in the province.

Some concern was voiced by Councillor Foster with regard to the concessions mentioned in the press. He felt that a committee should approach the Provincial Government immediately concerning these concessions, if any.

Councillor A. Walthen Gaudet however felt that since nobody could actually think of any concessions of any type that might hinder the grants, there was no sense in "looking for trouble."

It was also moved and passed that the City of Charlottetown tender a Civic Luncheon to Rotary's International Youth Assembly on August 18th. The Youth Assembly will be in the Island capital next weekend.

Radar Is Valuable Tool In Weather Forecasting

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (AP)—On the darkened radar-scope the sweeping finger revealed an intense bright cloud... moving fast... trailing an ominous little hook.

"Tornado!" the radar man shouted.

Quickly the radar weather scientists at Texas A. and M. college charted the twister's direction and speed by radar.

It was coming straight toward them, and the adjoining town of Bryan. Bryan's public school would dismiss in a few minutes, at 3 p.m.

Telephones spread the alarm to take cover, to keep the children in school.

When the tornado ripped through Bryan at 3:10 p.m. all the school youngsters were safe in the building rather than being on the streets. Only a few townspeople who hadn't heard the warning were injured.

BOUNCE OFF CLOUDS
Radar, of course, is invisible radio waves which bounce or echo back from a target or object. Rain clouds can be seen and tracked hundreds of miles away. Their changing shapes and motions give vital information.

For easier, more accurate charting of cloud changes and weather fronts, Dr. George L. Huebner Jr., has developed radar with a memory. It works this way:

The radarscope picture at any given moment can be recorded in a memory tube. Ten to 30 minutes later it is superimposed on the screen which shows clouds as they exist at this moment. The remembered picture is superimposed in red light over green. Overlapping areas become yellow and show in what ways and over what distances the clouds or fronts changed in that time.

USE INCREASING
Radar detection of tornadoes is increasing, and is being refined. Last April an experimental U.S. weather bureau radar at Wichita Falls, Tex., airport picked up an approaching tornado 15 minutes before it hit.

The savage storm demolished 50 buildings, damaged nearly 200, but casualties were held to one dead and 12 injured because citizens had been warned.



A.M. ROBINSON Appoint City Express Agent

It has been announced that Arthur M. Robinson, a native of Sussex, N.B., has been appointed Canadian National Express Agent at Charlottetown. The announcement was made Saturday by Mr. Neil McLellan, superintendent of express services for the Atlantic region.

Mr. Robinson, who is presently completing the CNR's staff training college at Bishop's University in Lennoxville, Quebec, joined the service as an express porter at St. John in 1940. From 1942 to 1945 he served with the R.C.A.F., returning to the CNR as a train messenger in that year. He was later transferred as claims clerk to the Superintendent's office in Moncton. In 1947 he was appointed express agent at Gaspé, Que., and later served at Chatham and Summerside.

Mr. Robinson and his wife, Dorothy, have one daughter.

IS TORNADO DETECTOR
This was one of the first successes, in April 1956, of radar as a tornado detector and warning. But it's just one way in which radar is becoming a powerfully useful eye for the weather forecaster and scientist.

Radar can also warn of flood dangers... spot little storms that slip through the network of weather stations. Radar with a memory can tell how fast clouds and fronts are moving or changing.

U. S. Defends Its Stand On Non-recognition Of China

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States contended Monday that its refusal to grant diplomatic recognition to Red China helps block "Chinese Communist attempts to extend Communist domination throughout Asia."

The state department explained its attitude in a strongly-worded memorandum sent Monday to diplomatic missions overseas.

The memorandum, signed by Secretary of State Dulles, vigorously restated American opposition to giving the Peiping regime a seat at the United Nations. Denying that it was pursuing an inflexible policy, the state department said:

"If the situation in the Far East were so to change in its basic elements as to call for a radically different evaluation of the threat Chinese Communist policies pose to the United States

and free world security interests, the United States would of course readjust its present policies."

A department spokesman said the review of China policy was being made public in answer to requests for such a statement from "a friendly government" and several American embassies abroad.

Press officer Joseph Reap declined to identify the government or name the embassies. He said publication at this time has nothing to do with an expected demand by Russia to seat Red China at the United Nations General Assembly session opening Wednesday.

The memo noted that most nations recognize Nationalist China in preference to Red China. The score is 45-19, with most of the 19 having recognized Peiping before the Korean war in 1950.

Israeli Urges Guarantee Of Independence In Mid-East

LONDON (Reuters)—Israeli Foreign Minister Golda Meir urged all countries interested in peace in the Middle East Monday to give guarantees for the independence of Middle Eastern states.

Answering questions at a press conference here, she said in the event of the United Arab Republic or Iraq occupying Jordan, Israel would have to consider seriously what measures to take to safeguard her boundaries and security.

Speaking after a day of talks with Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd, Mrs. Meir said the Middle East situation "calls for guarantees to be given to all independent countries which wish to remain free—that includes Israel."

Asked whether the United Nations should give such a guarantee, she said the UN could only pass resolutions and sometimes in the past that had not been enough.

NO AIRLIFT TALKS
Mrs. Meir said she had not discussed with Lloyd the ban on the Anglo-American airlift over Israel to British troops in Jordan.

When Israel was approached by the United States and Britain to give permission the situation was of great severity and Israel was interested in helping to avert any calamity in Jordan, she said. "We agreed to a certain specific operation."

When it was found this operation was taking a long time Israel asked for its suspension, she said.
