

Durelle, Moore To Match Gloves Again On July 15th

MONTREAL (CP) — Veteran world light heavyweight champion Archie Moore and Yvon Durelle of Bale Ste. Anne, N.B., have agreed to fight a return match here July 15, it was announced Wednesday.

The announcement was made by Eddie Quinn, head of Canadian Athletic Promotions, Inc., who promoted a fight between the two men here last December. That fight was considered one of the best bouts ever staged, with Moore winning by a technical knockout in the 11th round after almost being knocked out himself.

It was learned that Moore hopes to get around \$200,000. The figure was mentioned by Jack Kearns, Moore's manager. The guarantee was reported to be 40 per cent of the gate for the champion. Durelle's purse would be based on a percentage of the gate. Chris Shaban, Durelle's manager, said he is unhappy with the financial deal given his fighter but decided to go along with it.

Quinn indicated he would refer the bout again in the Forum — "where it never rains" — but as

things now stand the ball park is the spot. It has a seating capacity for a fight of 25,000 to 28,000, against 16,000 or so in the Forum, home of Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League.

Outside of announcing the fight and date, little official was made known.

Moore is reported to be guaranteed \$175,000 and Durelle \$15,000. Moore has the option of 40 per cent of the gate and television money.

Kearns said that out of the arrangement Moore could collect as much as \$250,000 if the ball park is jammed. It was stated authoritatively also that \$100,000 has already been guaranteed by television money in the United States.

Principals in the arrangements said television in the U.S. will go to private homes, as with the usual Wednesday night shows. In Canada the TV is to be on a closed circuit for theatres.

There are still some hitches regarding TV from U.S. stations near the Canadian border, such as at Plattsburgh, N.Y., and Buffalo. Stations there can be picked up easily in Montreal and Toronto.

With a \$175,000 guarantee, Moore is guaranteed \$100,000 more than for the Dec. 10 fight. Under the agreement for the first fight, 60 per cent of the TV money and gate was turned over to Durelle's interests. But Yvon had to guarantee Archie \$75,000. Archie also had the option of 40 per cent of both TV and gate; Durelle's option was 20 per cent of the gate.

SAME ARRANGEMENT

The same arrangement holds for the coming fight except for the whopping increase guaranteed Moore and a \$3,000 increase guaranteed Durelle. Durelle is to get his \$15,000 regardless of whether the 80 per cent of TV and gate, turned over to him, makes up Moore's \$175,000 or not.

Quinn is promoting the fight in co-operation with National Boxing Enterprises, headed by Truman Gibson, formerly of the International Boxing Club. The two staged the last scrap. Gibson was present Wednesday.

Kearns and Shaban said that under the agreement, Moore is guaranteed a return match should he lose the title to the New Brunswick fisherman.

If Moore wins, said Kearns, he may meet Sugar Ray Robinson somewhere in September.

GREAT FIRST MEETING

The return match between Moore and Durelle has been talked about since the sensational fight in which each battler went down four times — Moore three times in the first round. He came back to drop Yvon four times in the last six rounds, including the knockout wallop after 49 seconds of the 11th round.

"We did \$80,000 for the first fight although there was considerable indecision right up to the last day," said Gibson.

The reference was to an argument between promoter Quinn and the Montreal Athletic Commission over the television money claimed by the commis-

But after that fight, which was a great one, we can't help but double the take," said Gibson. "If you give people something good they'll come out to see it."

DECLINES COMMENT

Gibson declined comment on word from London, England, that Brian London won't get permission to fight heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson later this month.

The British Boxing Board of Control said it will not allow the British heavyweight to fight for the title, claiming the bout would be detrimental to boxing.

Moore had plans to fly back to California immediately. He said he weighs about 200 pounds now and will start training at once to get down to the 175-pound title weight.

Durelle was also overweight. He said he weighed 205 last week "but I've taken off 11 pounds since then."

Moore supplied the best wisecrack of the day when he and Durelle were lined up by photographers.

"Better get us now while we're both standing up," said Ole Archie.

Patrick Denies Blaming Worsley For Rangers Fall

NEW YORK (CP) — General manager Muzz Patrick Wednesday denied putting the blame for the failure of New York Rangers to make the National Hockey League playoffs on goalie Gump Worsley.

"It's not true that I blamed Worsley," he said. "I never singled out any player for such criticism and it's certainly unfair to put the onus on Worsley under these circumstances."

"The Gumper has been one of the top goalies in the NHL for the last few years," Patrick said.
