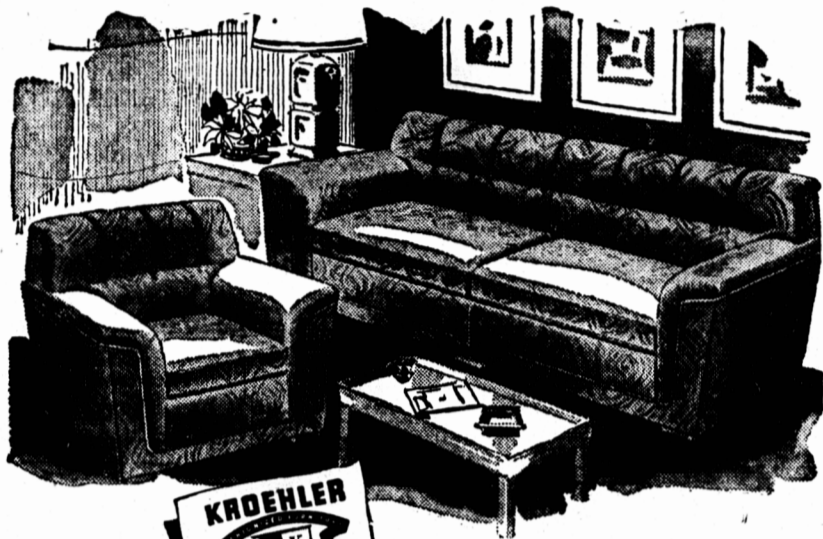

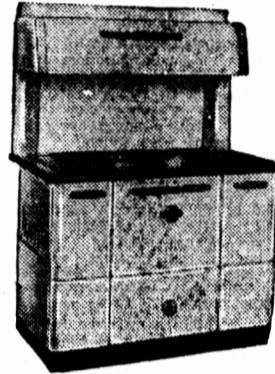

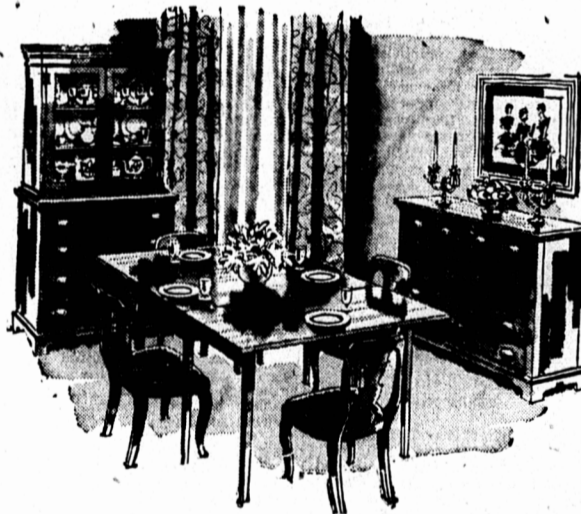

their height and fairly like blooms. For-Get-Me-Not in blue, pink and white will be every where and Aubretia with fragrant Arabis will be the first to bloom. Peonies, Sweet William, Lupines and the new Crabapple trees will be nearby and some fine new Delphinium.

It is fun to plant a new garden and a dozen new plants and bulbs will be added.

The Sandringham gardens might easily claim to be the most popular private gardens in the Empire—for Sandringham is the Queen's private property and not one of the Royal Palaces. They are open several days of the week and thousands have visited them through the years. None of the Royal gardens is of quite the same intimate relation to the Royal Family as Sandringham in Norfolk. At York Cottage, within the estate grounds, five of the six children of Queen Mary were born and brought up.

Indissolubly bound up with the intimate history of Sandringham is the work done by the head gardener. It was only in 1838 that Mr. T. H. Cook was succeeded by his brother Mr. Charles H. Cook, who had previously been head gardener at Windsor for some twelve years. The 8,000 acres

of the estate include a complete farm, large vegetable and fruit gardens, the famous flower gardens and park.

Many are familiar with the main layout of the actual gardens because these gardens are open to visitors, but few can remember the Avenue of Limes that were destroyed by a gale in 1908 but this calamity was the reason for a drastic replanning of the northern side of the estate and the creations of the wild gardens and a charming glade.

The delights of Sandringham and the taste of its owners are chiefly seen in the success with which Nature has been adorned. The northern side, under this arrangement, was skillfully allowed to grow apparently unconfined. This did not remove the necessity for planting some 36,000 plants of Erica carnea at the east end of the glade in a raised bed together with large quantities of spring bulbs. Many ornamental foliaged trees and shrubs have been planted here, as well as a large collection of Conifers.

In the West garden, water and stone have been used to the best advantage, against a perfect background of Birch, Pine, Broom Willow, Fern and the lovely low-spreading Hornbeam. It is impossible to go into the details of the rockgardens and the dell, but the visitor will find endless de-

light in exploring them.

Two features, which are illustrated in this book are worth stressing. First, those amazing herbaceous borders, the close planting and the contrasts in heights as well as colours. Then in another illustration, we see the topiary trees. There is a sunk garden near the Dutch garden, the dairy and the lavender garden, with quaintly clipped Yews and Box trees and prim beds set with trimmed Yew edgings.

Across the roadway that bounds the main section, to the eastern side, lie the kitchen gardens and the famous 70 yards-long pergola erected in 1905 which divides a fine flower garden, adjoining which are some 16 acres of kitchen garden. There is also the dairy garden and near by, is the Lavender Walk.

Zinnias are a feature of the flower beds at Sandringham, and the edging is of the grey-leaved Lamb's Ears (Stachys lanata). Lamb's Ears have been grown in this garden for years from seed sown in the open ground which was bought from an English seedsmen. The fragrant soft grey leaves make a beautiful edging when kept clipped low.
