THE ice is unfit for travelling, either on foot or with teams. Several horses broke through near the landing to-day, and were rescued with much difficulty.
COUNTERFEIT \$2 bills of the Bank of Montreal, have been issued which were not discovered to be bogus until they were being used to pay the police.
AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning two Scott Act cases were each fined \$50 for breach of the Act, and another case was dismissed.
ON Dec. 31, 1885, there were 3,409 roller skating rinks in the United States, and 130 in the Canadian provinces. By the 1st of March, this number had been reduced by over 2,000.
ARRANGEMENTS for the shipment this spring to the Maritime Provinces of a number of whitefish and salmon trout are being made by the Department of Marine and Fisheries.
PROFESSOR TANNER, who has just returned to Ottawa from the Northwest, reports that the feeling among the people of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories is most hopeful.
F. BAIN, Esq., lectures before the Literary and Scientific Institute this evening on "Ice Age in P. E. Island." From Mr. Bain's well-known ability a rare treat is expected and a good house desired.
CHICAGO is a bad place. Sam Jones, the well known evangelist, says that if he were to go home and tell his old neighbors what he knew about the city, they would say, "Sam, you haven't quit lying yet."
THE first penitentiary in Indiana was built of logs, and the first inmate was a farmer sent in for counterfeiting money. This prisoner was allowed to go home to do his spring planting, and also to put in his crop yearly during his stay.
THE first number of the Arrow, a Canadian journal of wit and humor, published in Toronto, is to hand. The cartoons in which Mr. Blake is portrayed as "alone with his grief," and pumping away at "the useless pump," are first class hits. The Arrow is a formidable rival to Grip.
Two double teams, owned by Benj. Heartz, Esq., and laden with manure, broke through the ice off Kensington Point this forenoon. HERNANDO, 2891 (Registered and Standard) will this year visit Charlottetown, Summerside, Centreville, Kensington and County Line, beginning at Charlottetown first week in May. The Hernando colt raised by Mr. C. Doekendorff and sold to G. L. Hillman, Quebec, has been resold for \$400, and Mr. H. writes that he thinks he could get \$1,000 for him had he kept him. He also calls him "the most promising colt in Canada, if not in America." This is a proud boast for P. E. Island and for Hernando. Good blood pays every time.
ST. GEORGE'S L. AND D. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT
OTTAWA, March 31.
The House met at three o'clock.
In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. Thompson said the Government of Quebec had not petitioned for a commutation of Riel's sentence. He also said Travis was still performing his duties in the Northwest, but an investigation is about being held, looking into his conduct.
The House passed a lot of motions for various documents, among them a motion of Tupper's for correspondence between the Government of the Dominion and the Nova Scotia Government in reference to the Short Line Railway.
The House, after passing more motions for papers, adjourned at 8.40 p. m.
A Sealer Crushed—Rioting in Newfoundland
ST. JOHN, Nfld, March 31.
The steamship Resolute, sealer and whaler, of Dundee, was crushed in the ice, off Notre Dame Bay, on Saturday last. Her crew, numbering 330 men, were forced to leap for their lives, abandoning everything. They travelled 70 miles over the ice and reached shore. Three men, named White, Phillips and McClusken, were missed and no doubt went down with the ship. The Resolute was commanded by the famous sealing captain, Jackmann. She had 20,000 seals on board.
A riot occurred here last evening. A mob, demanding railroad extension and work, drove the police from the Parliament Buildings and took possession of the Council chamber.
Further Resignations Looked For.
LONDON, March 31.
Rumors are rife that there will be further resignations from the Cabinet. The Tories calculate on Gladstone's defeat as certain. The Post says Parnell and Gladstone are both confident that the Irish vote will secure sixty additional seats in England for the Liberals in the event of a dissolution of Parliament. The Standard congratulates the Conservatives on the return of Lord Salisbury to muster the Opposition forces against Gladstone.
Irish Excitement.
LONDON, March 31.
Reports from all quarters of Ireland that have been sent to Gladstone, indicate that the people are in a state of the greatest excitement, and that a failure of the Home Rule policy will lead to an outburst of violence.
Land Bill for Ireland.
DUBLIN, March 31.
The Freeman's Journal says Gladstone's Irish Land Bill involves the purchase by the Irish Government, the Imperial Government furnishing the money, which shall be afterwards reimbursed by Ireland.
Belgrade Affairs.
BRUSSELS, March 31.
M. Barnuret, Minister of Finance, promises that the Government will assist unemployed workmen, and will therefore ask a credit of 43,000,000 francs.
Resumption of Labor.
BRUSSELS, March 31.
Work has been resumed in all the factories and collieries in Charleroi district. The total number of arrests made in Belgium is 2,500.
Hovering War Clouds.
LONDON, March 31.
The Times says Greece may precipitate war within a week, and it behooves the powers to do their utmost to avert the outbreak of hostilities.
Troops Asked For.
PARIS, March 31.
The Belgin Minister of the Interior has asked M. Freycinet to send troops to the frontier to prevent escape of rioters.
The Extent of the Damages.
KEY WEST, Fla., March 31.
The loss by fire here is estimated at \$1,500,000. Four thousand persons are out of employment and provisions scarce.

SHIP NEWS.
Passed Point de Grave, 24th ult., barks George Peacock, McDougall, and Isabel. Murchison, from Bordeaux for Charlottetown; Lucy Pope, McDon. aid, do do.
Report of the wreck of the schr. Ella Blanch, of Arichat: Left Portobello, with a colored pilot on board, for the coast of San Blas at 3 p. m., with a four-knot breeze. Got calm about two miles from shore, with a heavy sea, driving the vessel ashore. The three anchors were let go, but the vessel kept dragging until she got on a reef of rocks one mile from the shore. The captain and the men got in the boat, but it was soon upset, and the captain held on by one finger through the plug-hole of the boat 12 hours, the other two holding to pieces of the wreck. One of the crew was lost. The pilot was saved by the colored people on shore, who refused to render assistance to the captain and the others in the water. The captain and one man were finally saved by two Indians in a canoe.
