## Intelligence Clerk Has Varied Career

SUMMERSIDE — Cpl. Lloyd F. Bailey, presently employed as an Intelligence Clerk at CFB Summerside is unique in that he has served in all three of the Canadian Armed Forces. In addition to this, whilst in the Navy he was posted on loan to the Royal Norwegian Navy in 1941 and remained with them for two years.

Cpl. Bailey who was born and educated in Nashwaaksis, N.B., joined the Navy in 1940 and was trained as a telegraphist. It was shortly after his training that he was posted to the Royal Norwegian Navy. This is believed to be unique in that he was the only Canadian so attached during World War II. For two years he served on H. Nor. M.S. (His Norwegian Majesty's Ship) KOS 6, later to be renamed H. Nor. M.S. Farsund. This ship was a small armed escort ship carrying out convoy escort and anti-submarine duties in the North Atlantic. In 1943, prior to being returned to the Canadian Navy he was awarded the King Haakon VII Commemorative Medal, the Norwegian War Medal and a personally signed scroll by the now, late King Haakon VII for services rendered during his 2-year tour of duty with the Royal Norwegian Navy.

In 1954, Cpl. Bailey joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and has served on various stations in Canada and also with the United Nations Forces during the Suez crisis in 1956. He will be retiring from the service in 1969 and take up residence in his home town of Nashwaaksis. He is married to the former Henrietta deWitt of Advocate Harbour, N.S. and has three children—Shiela, Earl and Robert. Shiela is married and now residing in Stratford, Ontario where the Baileys have their first grandchild, David, aged 8 months.

With Cpl. Bailey's background and experience, it is only natural that his number one question today is "What's all this fuss about integration?" "I've got three different uniforms hanging in my closet now!"

## Western Man Remanded To Capital City Hospital

SUMMERSIDE — Thomas Adrian Gaudet, Miscouche, was remanded in the custody of the superintendent of Riverside Hospital, Charlottetown, by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's Court here yesterday. The magistrate took the action after hearing testimony from Dr. J.L. Saunders, a Summerside general practitioner.

Gaudet, charged with arson and break, entry and theft at the store of Alfred Gaudet in Miscouche, will be under observation at the hospital for 28 days and will appear before the magistrate on October 20 when a report from the hospital superintendent will be heard.

Four Summerside youths, Gary Wayne MacKeena, Ivan Joseph Arsenault, Robert Ernest Richard and Elmer Stephen Shavin, were remanded in custody to September 29 for a date to be set for hearing of two charges against each, with bail set at \$3,500 in two sureties of \$1,750 on each charge.

The four are charged with break, entry and theft and possession of a housebreaking instrument without lawful excuse, in connection of a break at the Elbis Store in New Glasgow. They had previously pleaded not guilty and elected trial by judge without a jury.

THREE REMANDED — Jacques Gallant and Joseph Camille Casey, Egmont Bay, pleaded guilty to separate charges of damaging a 1960 Pontiac car, the property of Everett William MacNeill, Wellington Center, to the extent of \$300. MacNeill, owner of the car, pleaded guilty to common assault. All three were remanded in custody without bail until September 26 when they will appear for sentencing.

The charge arose, Summerside RCMP Constable W.S. Pin-

sent told the court, from an incident on September 16 when MacNeill called at the Casey home in Egmont Bay asking for some money he said was owed to him. A fight took place, after which MacNeill ran to his car and the other two accused proceeded to pound the car with a stick and a lead pipe, causing the \$300 damage.

Joseph Basil Arsenault, Chelton, was fined \$35 and costs or 15 days for breaking a window at the home of Margaret Gallant, Central Bequete. He was also ordered to make restitution of \$252. Borden RCMP Corporal Clark testified for the crown. Neil R. MacLeod represented the accused.

Five Miscouche youths, Lloyd David MacKinnon, Joseph Clarence Campbell, Louis Joseph Poirier, John Joseph Gary Peters and Gordon Vernon Gallant, were remanded to October 20 on charges of possession of stolen goods from the store of Alfred Gaudet, Miscouche.

Accused, represented by J. Melville Campbell, pleaded not guilty to both charges, elected trial by judge and jury and was remanded for a date to be set for trial.

The case of a Borden woman, charged with illegal possession of liquor, was adjourned for decision to September 27. Two witnesses were heard yesterday, the accused and Borden Town Police Constable Johannes Plomp. Neil R. MacLeod represented the accused.

VANCOUVER (CP) — Saturday Night Publications Ltd. announced Thursday publication of a national trade journal for elementary and high school teachers will start early next year.

## New Service Will Assist Debt Ridden

TORONTO (CP) — A service for people being harassed by creditors was opened here Wednesday with the backing of two governments.

The Credit Counselling Service of Metropolitan Toronto offers a breather for the well-intentioned "over-spender" serious about wanting to make ends meet.

It will show people how to live on a budget with the surplus being paid into the agency for distribution to creditors.

"We'll serve as a buffer between the parties," said George Penfold, executive director of the agency. "The creditors will be told just how much the debtor can pay and that's it."

The province and the federal government have agreed to guarantee funds up to \$60,000 annually for the service.

## Romeo Hanover Wins \$75,000 Brown Jug

DELAWARE, Ohio (AP) — Romeo Hanover, 3-year-old colt, won the \$75,000 Brown Jug on Thursday to capture the three-year-old pacers in straight heats.

Guided by driver George Sholly, the big bay colt swept to a two-length win in the second heat, a quarter of a length better than his first heat margin.

Ring up his 15th straight success, Romeo sped the mile in 1:59.35 after posting a 2:01.25 in the initial heat.

It was the 33-year-old Sholly's first Jug victory in three appearances at the Delaware fairgrounds. It gave Romeo, owned by Lucky Star stable of Brooklyn, N.Y., and Morton Funder of New York City, the second leg in pacing's triple crown.

He won the Cane Futurity last May and now needs a victory in the Messenger Stakes in November to become the second straight horse to annex the coveted triple.

Fabled Bret Hanover claimed the honors a year ago.

## Vasco Second To Quit Black Hawks

By THE CANADIAN PRESS — Chicago Black Hawks lost their second veteran within four days when defenceman Elmer (Moose) Vasko walked out of the Hawks' National Hockey League training camp in Chicago.

Veteran goaltender Glenn Hall, who hadn't reported on the opening day of camp Monday, announced from Edmonton Wednesday that he had retired. Vasko, whose six-foot, three-220-pound frame gives him the distinction of being the biggest

player in the league, said Thursday he lacked interest in practice.

General manager Tommy Ivan said Vasko hasn't signed a contract, but this has nothing to do with the defenceman's move.

"Vasko told me he simply could not get himself up to practise," said Ivan.

"I think he's a little mixed up. I'm sure something is bothering him. Maybe he's not feeling well."

10-YEAR VETERAN — Vasko, 30, has played for the Hawks for the last 10 seasons. Meanwhile, New York Rangers continued their training at Kingston, Ont., while Toronto Maple Leafs worked in Peterborough, Ont., and Boston Bruins practised at London, Ont., and Detroit Red Wings practised at home.
