

SUPPORT NUCLEAR RESPONSIBILITY WEEK

The HOPE Environmental Group, as a member of the Maritime Energy Coalition, is supporting Nuclear Responsibility Week - Nov. 7-13th.

The week's purpose is to draw attention to the present state of public awareness and control over nuclear arms use and technological development.

The week of Armistice Day is chosen because at this time Canada stops to honor the brave men who fought so valiantly to bring freedom and peace to the world; many sacrificing their lives in the struggle. As we recall the horrors and sufferings of war, and loss of lives, we pray that this will never happen again.

A Third World War is an unthinkable prospect, for nuclear warfare denies even the faint chance of at least a courageous struggle, bringing instead only terror and devastation.

As Canadians, we must ask ourselves many questions. What is being done to stop the spread of nuclear weapons or to

reduce the enormous stockpile created by the Arms Race? Why are these weapons being produced?

What can be done to overcome the root causes of such insanity? How do we, as individuals and members of the Canadian nation, affect these root causes? Do we understand the implic-

ations of the use of peace-time nuclear technology? Is the world becoming more peaceful or secure? What is its

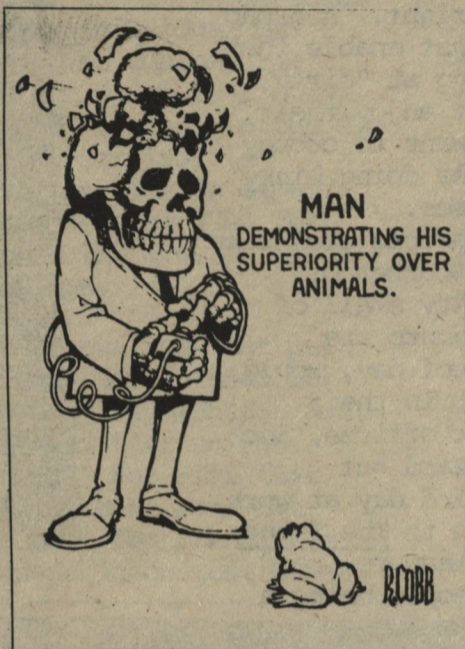
hope for the future? In the event of a catastrophic nuclear war could we stop the destruction?

What can we do about any of this? Indeed, we must ask, "What can I do?"

GIVE YOUR REGARDS TO BROADWAY

A second New York Theatre Tour is being planned for U.P.E.I. and Holland College students, faculty and staff, and members of the P.E.I. community.

The second annual New York Theatre Tour, under the auspices of the U.P.E.I. Department of Extension, is in the first stages of planning. The

one-week trip running from Saturday, February 25, 1978, through Saturday March 4, 1978, is open to U.P.E.I. and Holland College students, faculty

and staff, and to the general public. There are forty spots available for the trip, and these will be filled on a first-come first-served basis.

The trip will cost approximately \$290 for a round-trip airplane ticket a chartered bus to and from the airport in New York City, tickets for six major Broadway plays, and seven nights' hotel accommodation with four people to a room. (This

is an increase of approximately \$20 over last year's price,

resulting from increased air fare and accommodation prices and the decline in value of Canadian currency.) Single, double and triple rooms also are available, with relative increases in the price.

In order to insure all reservations, the deadline date for signing up for the trip will be December 9. A \$100 deposit is due on that day.

The balance for the trip

will be due January 10.
