### Driver Fined In S'ide Court

**SUMMERSIDE** — In Summerside police court Saturday morning Reginald Pridham of Alberton was fined \$100 and costs after pleading guilty to a charge of care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired. Magistrate R.S. Hinton, QC, presided. Pridham was found behind the wheel of a transport truck parked in Summerside Friday evening. Six parties pleaded guilty to intoxication charges and three were fined \$30 and costs while the other three were fined \$20 and costs.

The heavier fines were levied on those who created a disturbance and were arrested and charged with being intoxicated in a public place.

**DECIDE ON EXPANSION** In the last week MCS made a major decision to offer franchise rights to its system in cities across Canada.

"We're prepared to move fast," Mr. Ritchie said. He claimed his plan is the first of its kind in Canada. Now another company recently launched a similar plan in Toronto, Hamilton and Windsor.

The MCS expansion plan would involve local ownership and local control of credit in each city. Accounting would be centralized in the Ottawa office.

MCS keeps five per cent of all sales made through its credit cards. That's the main source of its finances.

**BILLED MONTHLY** The individual buyer gets 30-day credit without paying interest. He is billed once a month for all his MCS purchases in the previous month, and in effect has another 25 days to pay his bill without extra charges. On overdue accounts, 1 1/2 per cent a month is charged.

Bad debts are a loss to MCS—not the stores, Mr. Ritchie said. The same applies if someone's card gets into the wrong hands and is used illegally. "Any fraud like that is not a cost against the card-holder," he said.

The plan is tailored to operate on much the same lines as traveller's cheques.

In the mature class, Boswell's Blackadder Fashion Gem, a seven-year-old, produced 11,069 pounds of milk, containing 433 pounds of fat testing 3.90, while in the junior four-year-old class, Blackadder Treasure, also owned by the Boswell Estate, produced 10,941 pounds of milk, containing 427 pounds of fat testing 3.90.
