Eisenhower Leaves For NATO Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Dwight D. Eisenhower left for Paris late Friday for the NATO summit conference which begins Monday.

Eisenhower took off in his plane Columbine III, at 4:34 p.m., EST. Mrs. Eisenhower, Vice President Richard Nixon, several cabinet members and a number of other government officials and foreign diplomats were at the airport.

Bulgaria Sends Letter To U.N.

OTTAWA (CP) - Russian Premier Nikolai Bulganin, in a letter to Prime Minister Diefenbaker strongly criticizing NATO, has invited Canada to exchange trade missions with the Soviet Union and work toward mutual assistance "in good neighborly ways."

Before boarding a plane for the Paris meeting of NATO opening Monday, Mr. Diefenbaker commented to reporters that the letter was "couched in a language suggesting the NATO meeting was designed for aggressive purposes."

In his letter to Mr. Diefenbaker, Mr. Bulganin said that the Soviet Union's letter, various versions of which have been sent to all members of the United Nations, will not affect the unity of the forthcoming NATO meeting.

Bulgaria's 2,700-word letter was largely devoted to denouncing NATO and other Western security agreements and included a warning against Canada allowing the United States to stockpile nuclear weapons on Canadian territory.

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Army Is Boss In Indonesia

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BROUGHT RECORD CARGO

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If True Implications Will Be Difficult To Measure

PARIS (AP) - Britain was reported Friday to have won the race to be first in taming the power released when hydrogen bombs burst.

Diplomats of three countries said the British government is preparing to announce shortly some details of what has been termed a controlled hydrogen reaction.

The discovery of a British scientist working at the Harwell nuclear research station has been rumored for several weeks. The full implications cannot be known however, pending an announcement.

Britain, the United States and Canada are bound by an agreement to declassify nuclear secrets only after they are sure that the Soviet Union will not benefit from the new knowledge.

Informants said scientists of the three countries have been consulting for some time now to establish what non-strategic aspects of the British development can safely be made known.

Now the informants added, the United States and Canada have given Britain the green light. According to what one American described as "an informant if not revolutionary" advance in thermonuclear research shortly will be made public by the British.

It is known that British scientists have been working for years on methods to develop containers able to withstand the tremendous heat lost to a hydrogen explosion.

If the British scientists have discovered way of containing and controlling the energy produced by hydrogen explosions, the industrial and peaceful meanings would be difficult to measure. It might, for example, allow the need to use scarce and costly uranium as a raw material.

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Gov't Changes in Vokes Is Replaced By Alard

OTTAWA (CP) - The defence department has countermanded the appointment of Maj. Gen. Chris Vokes, 53, as vice-chief of the army general staff, Defence Minister G. R. Pearkes announced Friday.

Instead, the appointment will go to Brig. Jean Victor Allard, 44, commander of Eastern Quebec and was to have become vice-chief of the general staff in March.

Posting of Brig. Allard to army headquarters is considered by some officers as enhancing his chances of becoming chief of the general staff in several years.

It is known that the defence department for some time has wanted a French-speaking chief of staff in at least one of the services. There are no senior French-speaking officers in either the navy or RCAP but there are several in the army.

Brig. Allard, a native of New Brunswick, was appointed as vice-chief of the general staff in 1956. He was promoted to major general and took over his new post April 1.

NO POST FOR VOKES

The defence minister's announcement that Maj. Gen. Vokes' appointment as vice-chief of the general staff "will be postponed."

No new post for him was announced. It was reported that Brig. Allard was to have succeeded Gen. Vokes as chief of the general staff in March.

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Report More Than 60 Rebel Suspects Die In Wine Cellar

PARIS (Reuters) - The newspaper Le Monde and other news agencies reported that more than 60 suspected rebels had died in a wine cellar in Algeria.

The newspaper published what it said is the report by the commission on individual rights and freedoms set up by the government to investigate alleged excesses by security forces in the Algerian war.

The report quoted as saying there had been serious cases of torture but the commission feels that the French-speaking system but acts committed sporadically by individuals despite or without the approval of the government.

In one case, 100 Moslems arrested as suspected insurgents were locked in a wine store March 14 and the next day 50 corpses were found.

They called the report "helping the night but in vain," the report said, "because it will report acts of atrocities committed by insurgents against both Europeans and Moslems."

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
