What Emigrants Encounter.

To the Editor of the Examiner.
SIR,—That the tide of emigration should flow more freely into the United States than the Dominion will excite no surprise when we remember that their manufacturing, long established, fostered by protection, and even-fed by bounties, can afford to give wages to their operatives higher than the recently opened and struggling establishments in these Provinces; and thus our young men and women are induced to carry their labor to the best market. And with regard to the Western States, the facilities of reaching them are much greater, and preparation for the reception of emigrants more matured, while the advantages they possess are carefully set out, and perhaps not a little exaggerated.

The Crisis have been using every means of depreciating our Far West and extolling the capabilities of Dakota, Minnesota, etc., (quite regardless of any consideration except the obtaining possession of the sweet-scented office, and those of other interested parties, that the present Government urged the farmers of Great Britain to send out disinterested delegates, chosen by themselves, who might afford authentic and impartial information. Let us see, then, what they say on this part of the subject.

Mr. James Biggar (not the Irish agitator but a "canny Scotchman," able and experienced, from the Stewartry of Kirkcubright) opens his report with the following observations: "After speaking of the efforts made to induce settlers to take up lands in the United States, he says: "So many people have been deceived by overdrawn and highly colored pictures of the Western States, published by land companies, railway companies and others, that it is not surprising that much suspicion and distrust should exist." Mr. Snow, of Mid Lothian refers to intending emigrants to North America "being plied with all kinds of objections to the climate of the Dominion by interested agents" and speaks of the misery and disappointment so many met with, owing to their too readily accepting the advice of the "sharks" that beset them at every turn.

Mr. Anderson, delegate from Ireland, mentions a practice which I am sure no respectable Company or individual in the States above the level of the ring-droppers and confidence dodgers who unreasonably play on some unfortunate's yoke in London or New York, would resort to. "At one of the stations, says Mr. A. "I remarked two Yankees, apparently farmers, chatting together in the telegraph office. A little before the train started they got on board, and evidently wished to be thought strangers to each other. After a short time one of them entered into conversation with a Scotch emigrant, and discoursed eloquently on the horrors of Manitoba—said that it was a swamp, that he had gone up there to farm, had lost nearly all he possessed, and had given it up as a bad job. He called the whole thing a big take in on the part of the Canadian Government. The other fellow meanwhile joined in, and recounted his experience to a gaping audience, and then all praised Minnesota and Dakota in the most extravagant terms, pointing out the very country we were passing through (splendid land some of it appeared to be) as what they would get next to nothing."

The men were afterwards pointed out to me as touters." Mr. A. says that great inducements were held out to him by a land agent if he would consent to remain in Minnesota and induce his friends to settle there. He advises emigrants not to be kept back by any of the numerous American agents, though he says the land in Minnesota is nearly as good as that in Manitoba. But he states the yield of wheat in Minnesota to be but 18 bushels per acre, while that in Manitoba is 25.

The Cod Fishery.

A correspondent at St. John's (Nfld.) says:—"It is rarely that we have such encouraging accounts, regarding the summer cod fishery, at such an early period as at the present time. From Green Bay to Cape Race the fishermen are doing well, and have taken much more fish than at the corresponding period of the last years. The fish are abundant and of superior quality. May and the early part of June were unusually cold; and such a condition of the weather is usually followed by an abundant cod fishery. In Placentia and St. Mary's Bays, too, the prospects are good. The amount of supplies issued is rather above the average. The failure of the Norwegian fisheries is likely to enhance the price of codfish in foreign markets. Our bankers, so far, are doing well. The Orleaner, of Carbonar, arrived lately from the Banks with six hundred quintals, and a banker of Munn & Co., Harbor Grace, brought in five hundred quintals; the Mary Wetmore three hundred quintals.
