Agreement Reached On \$2,500,000 Ferry

An agreement has been reached between the minister of transport, the Canadian Maritime Commission and Northumberland Ferries Ltd. on the construction of a new ferry for the Wood Island-Carleton service. Fisheries Minister J. Angus MacLean announced over the weekend.

Under the agreement tenders will be called by the company at once and will be limited to Maritime yards only.

The new ferry will have an overall length of 240 feet and a breadth of 54 feet on the main deck. It will have a depth of 13 feet and a draft of 15 feet.

Other specifications include five traffic lanes on the main deck. Three in the centre will have a vehicle clearance of 12 feet 6 inches, and two under the

New Wharf Is Slated For Rustico

The new layout involves a relocation of the landing with the same overall dimension and estimated cost. It also involves a breakwater 675 feet long, with the inner 225 feet to be of rip-rapped earth fill and the outer 450 feet to be of timber construction, which would cost an estimated \$34,000.

A much larger mooring area would be provided with this revised layout, and in view of this the department has approved the change of site for the landing. Tenders have been called for the project, Mr. MacLean stated.

STEWART FUNERAL

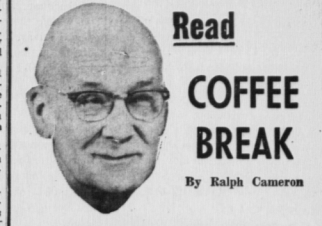

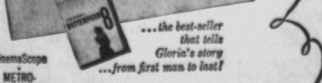

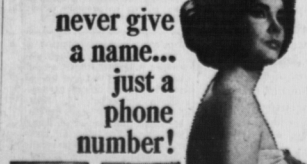
