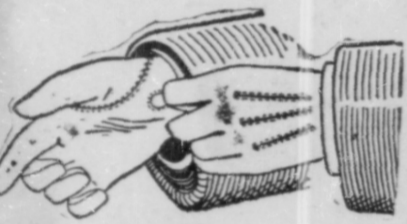

ALL THE RESERVES ORDERED OUT

No Confirmation of Yesterday's Despatch

GEN. FRENCH HAS A SKIRMISH WITH THE BOERS

Gunners ordered from Gibraltar to the Cape—Lord Charles Beresford on the Situation.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Speaking at Hackney, last evening, Rear Admiral Beresford said he long ago told the Secretary of State for War that the government was not sending enough troops to the Transvaal. Lord Beresford said: "This war is one of the biggest wars upon which we have ever embarked, owing to surroundings and the political circumstances; and, if necessary, every mother's son among us must go to the front."

British pluck and money will win, and then, with equal rights for all, the British flag must fly over the whole of South Africa.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—A special despatch received here from Weenan, Natal, Dec. 11th says: The Ladysmith garrison had made a sortie and destroyed Modder Spruit bridge.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The Government has decided to call out all the reserves and the militia.

Three hundred gunners have been ordered to proceed from Gibraltar to Cape Town immediately.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The War Office, last evening, made the following announcement: "The sixth division has been mobilized, and four battalions of this division will have embarked by Sunday."

The Government has also approved of the immediate mobilization of the seventh division.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The Queen has sent a message of sympathy to the widow of General Wauchope.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—There is no indication of the origin of the report that Ladysmith has been relieved, nor is there the least confirmation of it. There is eager even painful anxiety for news from General Buller, whose advance to the relief of Ladysmith is widely believed to have begun on Friday last.

When it begins, says one critic, the fate of the Empire will be centred in his camp.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The War Office has received the following despatch from General Foster-Walker at Cape Town:

General French wires, under date Dec. 13th, reporting a skirmish at 4 o'clock in the morning with 1800 Boers who were advancing southward toward Nanawaport. The skirmishing continued all the morning, the Boers fighting on a front of four-three miles. The enemy retreated with a loss of forty

killed and wounded. Our casualties were one killed and seven wounded, including one officer and two missing.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily News says—General Gatacre's men spiked their guns and shot their horses before abandoning their position.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The death is announced of Private Chappell of the Canadian Contingent which occurred at Belmont, Cape Colony, on the 13th, of consilites.

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The British War Office has heard nothing of the story of the relief of Ladysmith. The officials do not credit the report, as the relief of that place at such an early date is believed to be practically impossible.

MONTREAL, Dec. 14.—The Bank of Montreal has received a cablegram from London confirming the report that Buller and Clery have entered Ladysmith and giving the number of Boers captured as 3,500.

This cablegram was read on the floor of the Stock Exchange, and was received with tremendous enthusiasm.

Wild excitement prevailed for some time. All the members of the floor joined in enthusiastically singing Rule Britannia.

LONDON, Dec. 14.—One of several reports current here is to the effect that General Clery succeeded getting to the north of Ladysmith behind the Boer's position, where he is throwing up entrenchments.

If true, this indicates that Clery crossed the Tugela by flanking the Boers while Buller kept their attention riveted on Colenso.

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The following list of officers killed or wounded in the battle north of Modder River has been received:

Wounded: Col. Kelcaa, Major Berkely, Major Duff, Captain Featherstonhaugh, Captain Noyes, Captain Wolfe Murray, Capt. Richardson, Capt. Campbell, Capt. Gordon, Capt. McNab, Lieut. the Hon. W. C. Bailie, Lt. Scott and Lieut. Waterhouse.

Help for the Boers.

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 14.—The Plain Dealer says: "A party of 25 young Irish-Americans has left this city to join the Boers in their fight against Great Britain. At New York these men, who are mostly veterans of the Spanish-American war, will join about 500 other Irish men, and the entire party will sail from New York on Saturday for Paris. In the latter city the men will join an Irish regiment being formed to go to the assistance of the Boers. The recruits from this country come largely from Chicago, New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Cleveland and other cities. Five hundred more Irish-Americans will follow to Paris in a couple of weeks. Plans have already been made for the entire regiment of 1,000 to reach the scene of the fighting."

More Troops For Africa.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 14.—Two thousand troops, including the Yorkshires and Lancashires, embarked on the transport Majestic yesterday, bound for South Africa. The lord Mayor, many other prominent citizens and a great crowd of people witnessed their departure. The men were enthusiastically cheered.

A Petition

BRANDON, Dec. 14.—A petition is being unanimously signed asking the government to commute the death sentence on Hilda Blake, the woman sentenced to be hanged Dec. 27th.

Soldiers' Families.

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The unofficial members of the council in behalf of the colony of Gambia, propose to contribute £500 for the relief of the families of soldiers killed in South Africa.

Recruits in Manitoba

WINNIPEG, Dec. 14.—Recruits have been asked for in Rosenfeld, Saskatchewan, Souris and Brandon by Greenwayites. The majorities in these constituencies were very small, the aggregate of the four being only 43 votes.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—A notable tribute to Sir Charles Tupper and to his colleagues for their work as regards Manitoba is furnished in an immigration advertisement which Mr. Thomas Greenway issued three years ago. Mr. Greenway said in that production: "Twenty-five years ago the chief products of Manitoba were the furs of wild animals. Today (1896) these products are wheat, cattle, butter cheese. In twenty-five years the population increased from 12,000 to 200,000, the land under cultivation from 10,000 acres to 2,000,000 acres, and the number of schools from 16 to 382."

—Commenting on the result of the bye election here the Halifax Herald rightly says: "It was the answer of a free and independent people arising in indignation against the insulting threat of Sir Louis Davies that if these constituencies dared to elect Liberal-Conservatives they would be cut off from Dominion moneys for public works. The people of Belfast and Murray Harbor gave Sir Louis the only proper answer; they both elected Liberal-Conservatives, defeated the Grit Attorney-General McKinnon, broke the local cabinet ranks, and left the Farquharson government high and dry in a minority of two or more in the new house."
