CONTRACT BRIDGE

But at Sylvia's table the contract was defeated. West led spade and Sylvia (East) played the jack instead of the king. Sylvia did not dare refuse the jack, since the indications were that West had the A-K. So he took the jack with the queen and finessed the ten of diamonds.
Declarer would have made for the contract if the finesse had worked, but unfortunately for him, Sylvia won with the king and returned the king of spades. West overtook with the ace, cashed his spades, and as a result defeated the contract two tricks for a top score.
