Jess Willard Recalls Bout With Dempsey

By BOB MYERS LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jess Willard, the old-time heavyweight boxing champion of the world, sat in darkened silence watching an old movie.

Presently the oldest living ex-champion broke the stillness observing almost wistfully: "There he goes . . . I don't see how I could stand up under those blows."

Willard for the first time in many years was viewing the film of the fight in which a young Jack Dempsey smashed him into submission in three terrible, bloody rounds. The place was Toledo, Ohio; date, July 4, 1919.

Each year since that long ago sweltering afternoon in Toledo, sports enthusiasts love to hark back to the date of the fight.

DEMPEY FEROCEOUS

They never cease to marvel at the tigerish ferocity of Dempsey, the boxer battering taken by Jess.

Seldom is it pointed out that Dempsey was a hungry young sports enthusiast who took to the ring as a job.

Forgotten, too, is the fact that despite the damage inflicted by Dempsey in the first

REJECTS SHADOW

Willard does feel strongly, and so does a tight little group of friends, about the shadow cast over his entire career by one fight and one man, Jack Johnson.

Willard flattened Johnson in a ring in the Havana, Cuba, race track April 5, 1915, in the 20th round of a match scheduled for 45.

Johnson claimed later he took the fight. His proof was a loose still picture taken which shows Johnson ostensibly shading his eyes from the sun.

Not long ago the Willard-Johnson movie was uncovered in Australia.

The New York Yankees edged the Chicago White Sox 5-4 with a ninth inning run Wednesday and increased their American League lead to four full games as Detroit beat Minnesota 7-3. The Texas Rangers defeated the Los Angeles Angels 4-2, and the White Sox, who have dropped two in a row to the defending world champions, are 4½ off the pace.

Boston beat Cleveland 6-2. The Chicago Cubs bombed the New York Mets 9-2 and Milwaukee beat San Francisco 6-5 in the other day games scheduled.

Los Angeles was at Baltimore in the only American League night game while Cincinnati was at Houston and St. Louis at Los Angeles in the National League.
