Egyptian Native Courts.

CAIRO, Dec. 18. Lord Dufferin, British Ambassador, has submitted to the Egyptian government a scheme for the reform of native Egyptian Courts of Justice.

France Refuses a Presidency.

LONDON, Dec. 18. France has been offered and has refused the presidency of the Egyptian Debt Commission.

The Lough Mask Murderer.

DUBLIN, Dec. 18. Trial of Higgins the Lough mask murderer was concluded on Saturday and he was sentenced to be hanged.

Threatening Letters.

LONDON, Dec. 18. The Home Secretary has received a letter from parties in Ireland threatening to burn British government buildings as a revenge for the execution of the Joyce family murderers.

The British Cabinet Changes.

LONDON, Dec. 18. The new Ministers took the oath of office on Saturday as follows:— Lord Derby, Secretary of State for the Colonies. Earl Kimberley, Secretary of State for India. Sir H. E. C. Childers, Councillor of the Exchequer.

Obituary.

OTTAWA, Dec. 18. Mr. McKay Wright, ex-M. P., for Pontiac, Que., died here last night. [Mr. Wright was son of the late Lieut. Col. Ruggles Wright, and youngest grandson of Philemon Wright, the pioneer of colonization in the Ottawa Valley. Born at Hall, P. Q., Nov. 12, 1840. Educated at the High School, Montreal, and at McGill University, where he took degree of B. A., with first-class honors, in 1861, and that of B. C. L., from Law Faculty, in 1863. Married in October, 1864, to Mary, eldest daughter of the Hon. James Skene, Senator. Called to the Bar, L. C., 1863, and to that of Ontario, Michaelmas Term, 1868. He was Lieut. Ottawa Field Battery and served with his corps at the front during the last Fenian Raid; a member of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association; and of the Ontario Rifle Association; and a director of the City of Ottawa and County of Ottawa Agricultural Societies. Was a member of the law firm of Cockburn Wright & McCaul. First returned to Parliament, in 1872; re-elected in 1875 by acclamation, and defeated in late election. He was a Liberal-Conservative.]

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 15. Seditious proclamations have been posted in the streets of this city. Several persons have been arrested in connection therewith.

PARIS, Dec. 15. A telegram from Rome states that the clause arranging the Modus Vivendi between Russia and the Vatican has been signed. The terms are very satisfactory to the latter.

TOLEDO, Dec. 15. The Hall block, one of the finest in the city, has been burned. The loss is estimated at \$10,000,000. The fire started at 2 a.m., and was extinguished at 7 a.m.

LONDON, Dec. 15. The Telegraph's Paris correspondent says the expedition to Tonquin seems definitely abandoned, owing to President Grey siding with the opposing party in the Cabinet.

MADRID, Dec. 15. King Alfonso has authorized the Minister of Commerce and Agriculture to present a bill in the Cortes granting credit for 20,000,000 pesetas for the prosecution of public works, so as to afford employment to the distressed working classes in the southern provinces.

LONDON, Dec. 15. Rt. Hon. Wm. Forster, in a speech at Glasgow yesterday, said he did not think the Land Act required much alteration. He was sure the most powerful government that ever existed in England would be overthrown if it attempted to introduce home rule, which, he said, would never be granted, as it involved absolute separation.

BERLIN, Dec. 15. The Reichstag yesterday negatived a motion presented by the Socialist, Herr Nollwar, declaring that no sufficient grounds had been shown by the Government for prolonging the minor state of siege in Berlin, Hamburg and Leipzig. The House also resolved to take cognizance of the report of the government concerning the carrying out of the law against the Socialists. The Reichstag adjourned till Jan. 9th.

DUBLIN, Dec. 15. A meeting of the organizing committee of the Irish National League was held here to-day. Parnell offered a series of resolutions which were adopted recommending that no bill amending the Land Act be drafted.

ATLANTA, Pa., Dec. 15. While two young gentlemen and two ladies were returning from prayer meeting last night and walking upon the railroad track they were struck by an engine and were instantly killed.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15. A private despatch from Kingston, Ja., says forty acres were burned over and six hundred houses destroyed in the recent fire. Relief measures are being instituted here.

BELFANT, Dec. 15. A match manufactory here was burned to-day and four employees perished.

SHREVEPORT, La., Dec. 15. The steamboat "Kate Kinney" was burned to-day with a cargo of two thousand bales of cotton. Buildings near the wharf were also destroyed. Loss \$150,000.
