Yank Tells Canadians To Stop Crying Wolf, Wolf

Canadian exporters were urged Tuesday to stop seeing trouble in the United States before it happens and when there is little reason to believe it ever will happen. The urging came from E. J. Cannon, United States customs appraiser at Buffalo, during a round-table-discussion session at the annual meeting of the Canadian Exporters' Association.

Canadians, he indicated, shouldn't panic when an individual member of Congress, concerned about a local industry, makes what may seem a threatening speech. The United States had been on a trade liberalization program since 1934, with relatively new exceptions, and protectionist moves had many barriers to pass before they could become effective. R. G. C. Smith, Canadian commercial counsellor at Washington, said no product need be unnecessarily penalized under the present system of custom appraisal. He termed Mr. Cannon's appointment a "generous action of the United States."

Mr. Smith said the more information that could be circulated, the better. In trade hearings it was rarely mentioned that Canada takes a quarter of all United States exports. "We are very largely taken for granted," said Mr. Smith, "and Americans don't regard trade with Canada as foreign trade." Reply to a question concerning trade with Egypt, C. K. Highmore, head of the foreign exchange department of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, said exporters have the greatest opportunity Canada ever had to get into the export market in that country. Egypt will pay for imports from Canada in Canadian dollars and only in Canadian dollars, now that her United States funds are blocked by American action following the Suez crisis.

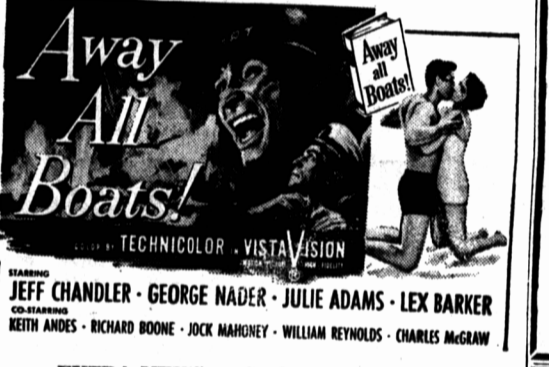
