

IN MEMORIAM

MR. PATRICK J. SMITH

Friends throughout the Province learned with regret of the passing of Patrick J. Smith of Newton, P.E.I. which occurred on August 14th after a brief illness at the residence of his son, John A. Smith with whom he made his home.

Born in Newton in 1857, the late Mr. Smith was a life-long resident of that community where through his natural industry he established a home which was the centre of an ideal Christian family life.

At the time of his death, he had reached the venerable age of 94 years. A gentleman of the old school, he possessed many sterling qualities of mind and heart which won for him the affection of the young people of the community and the respect and confidence of all who knew him.

His last years were made happy by the tender and kindly ministrations of his daughter-in-law, Mrs. John A. Smith, and his declining days were consoled and strength of soul given by the spiritual consolations imparted by his devoted pastor, Rev. Francis McQuaid.

A frequent testimony to the esteem in which the deceased was held was the largely attended funeral which was held from the residence of his son, John A. Smith, on Friday, August 17th, to St. Malachi's Church, Kinkora, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated at 9 A.M. by the pastor, Rev. Francis McQuaid, who also officiated at the interment service.

The pallbearers were: Louis Mulligan, John R. McCabe, John M. Mulligan, Alden Corr, Clayton McCabe, and Alden Mulligan. The funeral director was Mr. Philip Monaghan, Kinkora.

MR. JOHN S. NOONAN

The sudden passing of Mr. John S. Noonan of Borden, in the early morning of August 8th, was heard with deep regret by a wide circle of relatives and friends.

Mr. Noonan, who was proprietor of the Borden Inn retired from active work about a month previous to his death on account of ill health, and later entered the New England Center Hospital in Boston for treatment. But medical skill and loving care were of no avail. God called him and his spirit passed to his Heavenly Father.

Born at Bedeque in 1901, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William A. Noonan. He received his early education there and later spent several years in U.S.A. He was twice married, his first wife being Miss Pauline Cahill, who predeceased him. In 1939 he returned to Borden where he married Anne MacDonald, and for a number of years conducted a successful grocery business, previous to the opening of the Borden Inn. He was a devout Christian and Catholic, an exemplary citizen and a loyal, cheerful friend. Being of a kind generous nature he was ever ready to help every worthy cause and his place in the community will be hard to fill. His passing has left an aching void in the hearts of all, but in the family where his loss is most keenly felt they have the comfort of knowing that his death was not the end but a new Beginning. He was very fond of music and singing and for over ten years was Choir Director and organist of the Sacred Heart Church at Borden.

He leaves to mourn besides his sorrowing widow and little daughter, Patsy, two sisters Hilda, Mrs. Thomas Johnson, Rustico and Alice of Borden; also six brothers Andrew and Russell of Albany; Preston of Summerside; Dan of Charlottetown; James A. of Halifax, N.S., and Frank of Boston, Mass. Two other brothers Philip and Henry predeceased him.

The funeral was held at St. Peter's Church, Seven Mile Bay, where Solemn Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. Fred Cass, assisted by Rev. W. V. MacDonald as Deacon and Rev. E. Monaghan as Sub-Deacon. Rev. Leonard McKinnon was in the Sanctuary.

The numerous Mass Cards, Spiritual Offerings, messages of sympathy and flowers that blanketed the casket, bore silent tribute to one who was loved and esteemed by all who knew him.

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Accordingly, their pastor reported to the annual district meeting in 1931, the erection of a chapel 32 ft. by 26 ft. at Cape Traverse. This church occupied part of the land donated by Mrs. George Muttart to the Methodists for chapel and cemetery and for many years was not completed, the seats consisting of backless planks upon logs.

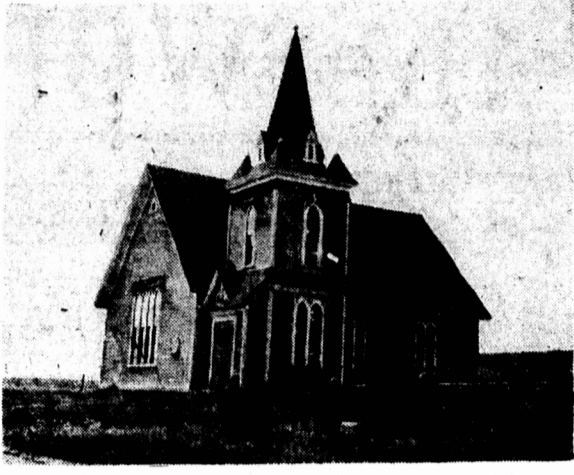
During revival years the missionary givings increased greatly and included donations from members of other congregations. Rev. John Marshall had come to Bedeque at the conclusion of the second great revival, which had spread throughout the province in the winter of 1844 under the inspired preaching of Rev. George Wheelock, whose name and memory came down through the years in persons who were named in his honor.

Thirty years after erection, the little church was renovated. The pews, with doors opening outwards, replaced the benches which in turn superceded the plank seats. There was one centre aisle with a wood stove which should have heated the church, but a winter custom of placing a lighted lantern near the feet, with a wrap encircling both, made for comfort without too much fire. The trustees at this time were: Messrs. John Muttart, Lewis Muttart, Samuel Leard, Charles Muttart, Robert Wright, William Silliker, Ephraim Bell, Alex Strang Isaac Clark and John D. Muttart. For many years Captain Lewis Muttart and his brother John, led the singing. The gallery was not erected until 1884 when a reorganized choir and a new organ moved upstairs from the front pews which they had been using. The organist was Minnie Clark, Mrs. Robert Muttart.

As the old church outgrew its usefulness, Messrs. Lewis Muttart and Alexander Strang were instrumental in having the present church begun in 1889, upon land donated by Mr. Montague Muttart, grandson of Mr. George Muttart, upon whose property the first one was erected. The contract was given to Mr. Nathan MacFarlane of Summerside.

In July, 1890, the building was dedicated to the Glory of God with Rev. H. P. Cowperthwaite presiding and Dr. Burwash preaching the sermon. In an old newspaper dated July 31, 1890, the following item appeared: "At the church opening at Cape Traverse on Sunday last \$173 was realized

Cape Traverse United Church



On the Borden-Charlottetown highway in the district of Cape Traverse, overlooking Northumberland Strait, there stands a United Church with an historic background.

This congregation had its origin in the home of Mr. George Muttart. He was the eldest son of Corporal Balhazur Muttart, who had been with General Wolfe while scaling the Plains of Abraham in the capture of Quebec, and who was one of the earliest British settlers in Tryon, arriving about 1759.

Mr. George Muttart was brought up as a Roman Catholic, for a time being a lay leader in Tryon for his church. About 1793 he was converted by Nathaniel Wright, but could not decide which of the Protestant communions to join. However, upon the birth of his eldest son, Charles, in 1798, he was so convinced the child would grow up to be a good man that he made a vow to join the church to which his son would give allegiance.

In 1815, Charles Muttart became a Wesleyan Methodist and his father joined at the same time. George Muttart moved to Cape Traverse in 1805 and built the house where most of his large family was born. His home was always open for Methodist preaching and class meetings. Although he and his son Charles were both charter members of the Tryon Methodist Church where they frequently attended the Sunday morning service, their desire grew to build a place of worship nearer home.

In August of last year a Diamond Jubilee Service was conducted with the minister, Rev. E. R. Woodside preaching the sermon. At this time a beautiful Pulpit Bible, donated by Messrs. Hudson, Wilfred, Fred and Lloyd Lowther, replaced the one in use since 1850. Two attractive book marks were presented by Mrs. Leigh Lowther. The newly installed electric Memorial Chimes, donated by Mr. Ernest W. Harper in memory of her husband and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Muttart, were dedicated to the Glory of God by Rev. A. S. Weir, president of the Maritime Conference, on September 23.

During the summer months extensive improvements were made to the property consisting of the construction of a basement furnace room, the installation of a new heating system, a choir loft, the addition of two Sunday School rooms, the lowering of the ceiling, and the finishing of the walls attractively in plywood.

All this has been done with an excellent combination of interest, cooperation and hard work which augurs well for the future of the Cape Traverse congregation.
