

Hornets Take First Game In Total Goal Series 8-3

Milton Hornets displayed too much scoring power for Cornwall Meteors as they took the first game of a two game total goal series to the score of 8-3. Cornwall lost the game early in the second period when successive penalties to Burke and Carmichael allowed the Hornets to run rampant and score three goals in a little over four minutes. And with the score five to one against the Meteors found it too big a deficit to overcome.

A crowd of upwards of a thousand people attended the game which was highlighted at times by some heavy body checking as the players of both teams tossed their bodies around with reckless abandon. Milton took an early lead when McKenna scored on Duffy's rebound at 0:15. G. Cruwys, who incidentally picked up six points for himself, made it 2-0 at 14:03 and Jack Brown put Cornwall in the running at the 17:48 mark.

The Hornets were not long taking advantage of the penalties received by the Meteors early in the second period when they rapped in three unanswered goals in the first six minutes of play. Shortly before the period ended Kelly put the puck past Simmons ending the period 5-2 for Milton.

At 6:48 of the third, Gerald Cruwys added another for the Hornets when he grabbed a long passout to race in on Strain unopposed. The Hornets did not resort to any "Kitty bar the door" tactics even though they were enjoying a good lead. They easily awarded a penalty shot when Carmichael threw his stick in an effort to prevent a breakaway by Cruwys, who took the shot but was unable to score.

MacLean scored on a faceoff and 13 seconds later Andrew made it 8-2. These two goals were scored while Carmichael was in the penalty box. Cornwall scored a goal

at the 18:24 mark which was disallowed when referee Goodwin blew down what appeared to be a smothered puck by Simmons. However Brown's scoop-shot was not counted. A minute later the Meteors got the goal when Bradley scored on a pass from Brown. Cornwall goes into the final game with a five-goal deficit.

C.A.H.A. Asks For Concrete Suggestions From Critics

The much-maligned Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Monday night invited critical Canadian sports writers and others to "come up with some concrete suggestions" about choosing the country's representative in future world hockey championships. It warned: "It isn't the simple problem it appears to be."

Smarting under a country-wide barrage of criticism as a result of Canada's 7-2 loss to Russia in the tournament at Stockholm, C.A.H.A. secretary-manager George Dudley of Midland, Ont., presented the C.A.H.A.'s case in a statement to The Canadian Press.

In effect, he said, it was "impossible" to send a team of higher ranking than the senior B Toronto East York Lyndhursts that bowed to the Russians in what has been described as a "black eye" to Canada, a "catastrophe," a "national calamity" and "a resounding slap in Canada's face."

The issue will be threshed out at the C.A.H.A. annual meeting in Vancouver May 10, but sports writers, former professional players, coaches and just about anybody who ever had anything to do with hockey, pounced on the C.A.H.A. None blamed the Toronto team for

the loss and many felt that the C.A.H.A. chose "a boy to do a man's job."

Many charged the C.A.H.A. with "stupidity," "bungling," "blundering" and "short-sightedness." Some suggested that Canada should pass up the championships if the C.A.H.A. can't choose a stronger team than a senior B outfit and others called for a "new deal" in the C.A.H.A.

"To all this, Dudley put it squarely to critics to solve the problem. "In my opinion, teams in Canada which could be regarded as better than the Toronto East York club are those competing in the senior A and Junior A series of the association, and these are very expensive teams to operate. It would be out of the question to remove them from competition in their various leagues even for the length of time that would be involved in flying them to Europe and back.

"This would involve a minimum loss of time of at least 15 days and it would come just at the time the senior A or Junior A leagues have started their playoffs or when clubs are in their last drives for a playoff position. In my opinion it would be impossible to get one of these clubs to leave."

No Wealthy
Dudley stressed in his statement that "if a team was flown to Europe and back for the championships the expenses would have to be paid by the C.A.H.A."

"While the general impression prevails that the C.A.H.A. has lots of money, that is not so. "I believe the C.A.H.A. could afford to pay for such a trip for one year only, if it were possible to find a senior A or Junior A club to go, but this would be out of the question as a permanent annual policy."

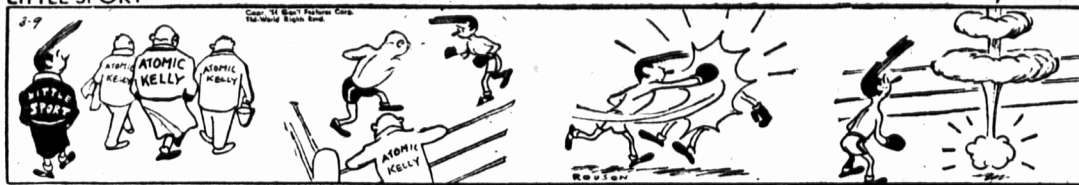

Here's How They Look

Roy Buck Whitlock (centre), a local player is in his second season with the club. Buck is 30 years old and weighs 170 lbs. He has held top scoring honors in the M.M.H.L. for four seasons and this year has scored 50 goals in 48 games. A neat stickhandler, he is a very dangerous player around the net and will be a marked man in this series.

Roger Bessette (goalie), age 32, weighs 165 lbs. He has played 10 years of professional hockey in the American League, three of which were on championship teams. An affable fellow, Roger is a great team man and in addition to his value as a goal tender has done much to spark the club when the going is tough.

"Peanuts" Don McLaughlin, age 24 is a native of Halifax where he played all of his junior hockey and most of his senior hockey. A rugged defenceman "Peanuts" enjoys the rough going. Opposing players find that the stiff checks handed out by this defenceman have a telling effect.

Vip Palladino is a Sudbury product who has played outstanding hockey for the Islanders ever since he came to the club. He is a fast skater and a good puck carrier. At age 24, weighing 165 lbs., Vip will present a problem for McMeekin in this coming series.

Paul Saindon, age 24, is a 155 lb. left winger who has seen most of his hockey in the Province of Quebec where he played junior with Three Rivers and senior hockey with Valleyfield Braves and St. Hyacinthe as well as with Providence Reds. He has goal scoring ability which should be a factor in winning the M.M.H.L. championship.

Maple Leafs Offer To Make Tour Of Russia

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League have offered to make a tour of Russia, managing director Conn Smythe said Monday in a telephone interview from Florida, where he is on holidays.

Smythe told the Toronto Telegram that the only condition is "suitable compensation" which would include travelling expenses and a small remuneration for the players.

He would "very much like to see Canada regain her lost prestige in world hockey," said Smythe who added that he would personally accompany the team which could leave right after the NHL playoffs.

A committee of Toronto citizens has started raising funds for the trip which would include a brief tour of other European countries than Russia. It was estimated the trip would cost \$50,000 excluding any share of gate receipts.

Toronto's Mayor Allan Lamport said Monday he personally would put \$5,000 in the kitty to send the Leafs to Russia.
