NEW ORGAN TO BE DEDICATED AT SERVICE

Zion Church To Mark 100th Anniversary Sun.

The congregation of Zion Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, will observe its 100th anniversary Sunday. Services will be conducted by the pastor, Rev. Donald A. Campbell, B.A., and special music for the occasion will be provided by the choir under the direction of Miss Gladys Waddell. B. Mus., the organist and director of choir.

A special feature of the morning service will be the dedication of the new memorial organ. The new pipe organ, built by Casavant Freres Limited of St. Hyacinthe, Que., replaces one which had been in use for more than 50 years.

It occupies the same space as the old organ and its total weight is eight and a half tons. It contains 1,528 pipes ranging in size from an overall length of 17 1/2 feet with a diameter of about 1 1/2 inches down to a speaking length of three quarters of an inch with a diameter of less than half that of a lead pencil.

The organ has 21 stops and provision has been made for the installation of chimes at a later date. A stop is a row of pipes, 61 in number for the key-board and 22 for the pedal-board. These stops are divided into families — the diapason or consisting of the strings, flutes, and the reeds. Each stop is "voiced" to produce a certain quality of tone.

The chests, upon which the pipes stand and which contain the valve mechanism, are made largely of mahogany. The valve mechanism is controlled by electromagnets and air pressure. Air is supplied by an electric blower which is located in the basement.

The console, which is the nerve centre of the organ, was the organ is played, has an intricate system of wiring magnets, pneumatics, stop knobs, pistons, two key boards and pedal board. All key contacts are of sterling silver. The console is connected to the organ by cables composed of fine wires. The total length of wires between console and organ exceeds 4 miles.
