TO-MORROW, at 10 o'clock, His Lordship Bishop McIntyre will celebrate High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, for the repose of the soul of the deceased Pontiff, Pius IX. His Lordship will also preach the memorial sermon.

EX-MAYOR, William Workman, of Montreal, died on the 21st inst., after a lingering illness. He was possessed of great wealth, a considerable portion of which he bequeathed to the city of Montreal for benevolent purposes.

STILL ANOTHER NEWSPAPER FOR SOURIS. We learn that a company has just been formed in Souris, who intend, in a few weeks, to publish a newspaper, to be called the *Souris Tribune*. The prospectus will appear in a day or two. We wish the enterprise every success.

SOURIS.—The commercial metropolis of the Eastern section of King's County can boast of its churches, schools, banks, manufacturing, mercantile houses, ship building, law courts, members of the medical profession, and we learn that this week, for the first time, an attorney, notary public and barrister has located himself in that thriving town.

A sad disaster took place near Bridgewater, N. S., on the 23rd inst. The house of David Oikle, on Pleasant River Road, about ten miles from there, was destroyed by fire. The inmates were asleep when the flames broke out. Mr. Oikle's father and mother, an aged pair, escaped by leaping from an upper window—the latter breaking her arm. Mrs. Oikle the younger was severely burned, and a son about 15 years old lost his life in the flames.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, Hugh McNeill, drunk and incapable, was fined \$3 or 14 days; Pius McEachern, for assault and battery on the person of Daniel Marshall, remanded until tomorrow for further evidence. The case Jas. F. Montgomery, for disorderly driving, was postponed for further evidence, Thomas McAllister, for supplying liquor to a minor, was fined \$2 or 8 days; Michael Rotchford, charged with threatening Wm. Lockhead, in order to extort money from him, was summoned to answer the offense. There being no appearance, a warrant was issued for his arrest.

### WAR NEWS.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Feb. 27.

The reason that the Russians demand of Egyptian tribute concerns England, is that the tribute is already pledged as security for interest on the Turkish loans of 1854, 1855 and 1871. The first of these was raised to carry on the Crimean war, and the second was guaranteed by England and France. All of which are largely held in England.

By the terms of agreement between Turkey and the British Government and bondholders, Egypt now pays tribute directly to the Bank of England.

The Russian proposals will abrogate the convention without consulting or indemnifying the beneficial assignees and make the English and French Governments liable for the 1855 loans.

In the House of Lords to-day, Lord Derby, replying to an inquiry of Earl De Larr, confirmed the statement that the signature of the treaty of peace was expected yesterday, but said that when he left the Foreign Office no information in relation thereto had been received. The version of the peace conditions are widely divergent respecting Bulgaria and the indemnity. Some persons say the indemnity is £20,000,000 sterling, which is fabulous, while others say it is £10,000,000 sterling, the latter amount independent of any territory cession.

The Times' Berlin despatch says it appears that the Austrian Cabinet are once more encouraged by their friends to aspire to acquisition of Bosnia, Herzegovina, Albania and part of Macedonia, but there is little hope that Austria will know how to vindicate her position in the south-east.

Notwithstanding the menacing language held at Vienna, it is regarded probable that an arrangement, which tends to make Turkey Slavonic, will be ultimately acceded to, if the present influence continues to prevail.

The "Times" leading article approves on principle Lord Derby's statement in the House of Lords last night, but concluded that the Government must review the final terms of peace very carefully; and if some of the rumored conditions prove to be really demanded, they ought to be met by the strongest protest.

The time to resist such demands, however, will be when we know they are really made. If the treaty of peace is signed within the next day or two, we will be able to review its terms with calmness, and then there will be time for the Ministry and Parliament to decide how far they will demand a protest or resistance on the part of this country.

The Pall Mall Gazette's Berlin despatch says that Germany will be represented at the Conference by the Prussian Secretary of State, Herr Von Bulow, assisted by the Counsellor of the Legation, Busch. General Todtlin has been recalled to St. Petersburg.

BUCHAREST, Feb. 27.

The Roumania *Libera* announces that the Roumanian troops have been obliged to recross the Danube from Widdin, to make room for the Russian army.

### OUR OTTAWA DESPATCH.

(Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 27, 1878.

Dalton McCarthy delivered a great and grand speech in answer to the Budget speech. He showed that the Grits were more extravagant, when most economical, than the Liberal Conservatives were when most extravagant. He proclaimed himself a Free Trader on principle, but believed it necessary to readjust the tariff, if the manufactures of Canada are to hold their own against the present unfair system of the United States. He spoke strongly in favor of Reciprocity, and closed by declaring Cartwright's picnic villification of Sir John as scandalous. He said if Cartwright believed Sir John to be a thief, liar and embezzler, it was his duty to have Sir John brought to justice.

Patterson replied. He said: "I am a Protectionist, and support the Government because it has carried out my principles; I would not support the Opposition because I think the Government has afforded protection enough." He attacked Dr. Tupper because he advocated taking duty off coal and oil. He would like to see sugar protected, but thought the question too difficult to grapple with.

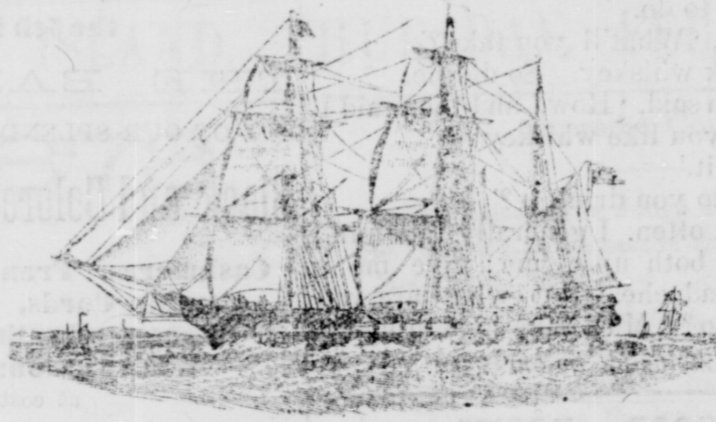
