THE QUEEN'S VISIT TO CHERBOURG.

The correspondence from Cherbourg leads to the conclusion that, as a display, the affair fell rather short of the anticipations generally formed. The English yachts gave the principal share of animation to the scene. Her Majesty's voyage on Wednesday week was accomplished in less than six hours, notwithstanding the delay of half an hour occasioned by a tough piece of seaweed getting into the machinery of the Royal yacht.

In the evening the Emperor and Empress went on board the Royal yacht, and remained for upwards of an hour. At eight the fleet was brilliantly illuminated.

The Imperial banquet on board the Bretagne took place on Thursday evening, and was succeeded by a magnificent display of fireworks. For more than an hour their flow into the air was incessant. Now it was a tremendous cascade of fire; then a bouquet of 5,000 coloured rockets; next devices and coloured austeride, with bombs and varied fires, till the spectacle was literally almost too dazzling.

The Imperial banquet on board the Bretagne took place on Thursday evening, and was succeeded by a magnificent display of fireworks. For more than an hour their flow into the air was incessant. Now it was a tremendous cascade of fire; then a bouquet of 5,000 coloured rockets; next devices and coloured austeride, with bombs and varied fires, till the spectacle was literally almost too dazzling.

On Friday morning the Prince of Wales paid a lengthened visit of inspection to the breakwater, the Duke of Cambridge having done so on a previous day. In the course of the morning intelligence was received of the successful submission of the Atlantic Telegraph. This gave rise to tremendous cheering from the sailors of our fleet.

ACCIDENT TO THE EUROPA OFF CAPE RACE.

We are indebted to a young friend of ours, who took passage in the Europa for Liverpool, for the following account of the accident to that steamship off Cape Race:—

STEAMSHIP EUROPA, St. John's Harbour, Monday evening, Aug. 14.

My Dear Friend,— When last we parted I little thought that I should soon be addressing you from this corner of the globe. You will have heard of our mishap and miraculous escape by means of the Telegraph, but I dare say a few of the particulars will not be uninteresting to you, so here goes: "I had left the saloon and was sitting in the purser's room; time about 10.30, when we heard the second officer bawl out: "hard a port,"—"hard a port,"—"hard a port!" I bolted up on

deck, followed by the purser, and saw a steamer's green light apparently about 40 yards off, on our port bow,—on she came, and in the space of three seconds struck us well forward and immediately surged alongside, her starboard and our port paddle boxes coming into violent contact, and the shock causing us to heel over most alarmingly. Both vessels immediately blew off steam, and in a very few minutes a boat put off from the Arabia, and when half way across to us, we were now perhaps 80 yards apart, hailed us, "What steamer is that?" "Europa!" "Do you require any assistance?" "Come alongside!" says Capt. Leitch; and so onward they came. Meanwhile there was great terror and confusion among the firemen and passengers on board the Europa; immediately after she struck, a lady rushed to me and said, "oh, shall we be saved?" and then burst into tears.
