LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS. THE COILA.—The steamer Coila arrived from Philadelphia last evening with a cargo of coal for C. Lyons.

THEATRE.—Harry Lindley's company of players will begin a season at the Lyceum theatre, Halifax, on Sept. 3rd.

THE MARKET.—The market to-day was fairly well attended, and except produce was well supplied. No material change in prices was noted. Oatmeal from this season's oats was on sale at 35 per lb.

POLICE PENALTIES.—An assault case between two women comes up for trial on Tuesday, and a number of boys have been summoned to answer a charge of swimming in a nude condition about the wharves.

SUBJECT DEATH OF A PRIEST.—Rev. H. McMillan, of Philadelphia, arrived at Halifax on Sunday evening in company with three other priests, seeking rest and recreation. On Tuesday morning at two o'clock he was stricken with paralysis, and an hour later he was dead. Father McMillan was 59 years of age.

A TERRIBLE DEATH.—Walter Hogg, of Wilton Valley, a middle-aged farmer, went out to where his bull was on tether this morning, when the animal turned on him and gored him to death. It was some time before the body could be recovered. Mr. Hogg was a farmer in good circumstances, and was a cousin of Mr. Robert Hogg, Customs Appraiser.

TOO BAD.—There was no promenade concert in Queen Square gardens last evening. Mr. Galbraith informs us, because the electric lamp had been taken away and there was not sufficient light to play. This is too bad. These promenade concerts are a source of pleasure to our citizens, and they should not be deprived of the treat thus afforded for the want of light.

TRANSFERRED TO KINGSTON.—Five prisoners from Dorchester have been transferred to the penitentiary at Kingston. Among them are "Jim," "Buck" and "Al" Lane, and Giles, of Prince Edward Island, who is in prison for the murder of Callaghan. It is reported that these prisoners became unmanageable and to ensure their safe-keeping it was thought advisable to have them removed to Kingston, as stated.

A KINDLY ACT.—The Picton Standard says: A pretty incident occurred in connection with Lord Aberdeen's visit. A little girl of one of our townsmen had followed the procession through the entire course, even until the party were on their way to Norway Point. When near the gas works Lady Aberdeen noticed her, and calling the little one in kissed her and giving her a flower, told her to rest where she was, as they would return the same way.

A MALIGNANT ACT.—On Wednesday night, 22nd inst., at Darlington, Donald E. Baile's horse was taken out of the pasture and placed in the potato field on his farm adjoining D. McPherson's. The potato tops were saturated with Paris green on the previous day, and strange to say the animal is none the worse so far. Strong suspicion rests on a certain party, and we hope Mr. Campbell will procure sufficient evidence to locate the guilty one, and have them punished for this foolish deed.—Guardian.

A STRANGE STORY.—About four years ago John Baile, coal dealer of Montreal, disappeared, and was mourned by his family as dead. He had \$2,000 insurance in a benevolent society, but although application was made for the money, it was never paid. Last week Baile's brother-in-law happened to be in New York, when he ran across the missing man. Baile declared that he was drugged, and when he came to his senses he was horrified to find himself in a New York state lunatic asylum. But he does not explain why he did not return home upon being released.

CONCERT AND BASKET GIVEN.—The concert and basket social given under the auspices of the Choir of Vernon River North Methodist Church on the evening of the 22nd August was a grand success. After rendering a programme of fifteen choice selections of music, recitations, dialogues, etc., thirty baskets were sold at auction by Mr. John McKenzie, of Kingston, who very kindly acted as auctioneer, and to whom much praise and many thanks are due. The hall was filled with an attentive and intelligent audience, and the best of order prevailed. The proceeds amounted to \$41.91.

APPOINTED SURVEYOR.—We congratulate Mr. John P. Nicholson, of this city, on receiving authority to act as a surveyor of lands in this Province. We are glad that he passed a highly satisfactory examination before the Provincial board of examiners and has been found competent and qualified to practice the profession of land surveying. The examiners have granted Mr. Nicholson a regular surveyor's certificate and he was sworn in to-day before His Lordship the Chief Justice at Chambers. A YOUNG MAN FATAALLY SHOT.

William McMillan, of Wood Islands, shot by James McNeill.

A picnic which was held at Wood Islands on Wednesday last ended in a very sad way. It appears that in the evening a number of the picnickers were conversing the fun by having a party. Some of the younger members were particularly jolly, and three or four of them started out to visit a friend's house some distance away.

The party, it is said, proceeded to take charge of a young man, named there, and ordered them out. They went into the yard and began skylarking there. Their fun was suddenly ended, however, when McNeill appeared at the window and discharged a shot gun at the young man. The charge, consisting of sparaballs, struck one of them, Mr. Wm. McMillan, in the stomach, causing a shocking wound, as the victim was only about 6 yards away from the gun. The injured young man was taken by his comrades to a house near by and a doctor sent for, who pronounced the case a very serious one.

McMillan was taken to his home, where he lingered until ten o'clock this morning, when his death occurred. Drs. McLaren and Barnes attended him. An inquest will probably be held this afternoon.

A great deal of sympathy is expressed for the young man's parents. He was a son of James McMillan, Esq., of Wood Islands, and only 25 years old.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Despatches from Shanghai say communication with Corea has been stopped completely. Correspondents who started recently for the peninsula have returned, as they found it useless to proceed to the seat of war.

ENNSBURG, Pa., Aug. 21.—Judge Parker has been sitting yesterday morning in the Gallitzin case, in which W. T. Kerr, of the Junior Order of United American Mechanics, sought to restrain the board of directors of the Gallitzin public schools from employing nuns as teachers. The decision permits the nuns to teach in the public schools when they have proper certificates from the county superintendent, and to wear the garb of the order while teaching. It also permits the children to address the teacher by her religious name, as "Sister Maria Theresa," or as "father," if a priest, but forbids the use by the teachers of the Catholic catechism or other Catholic books, either in school hours or out, while in the building. All costs were divided.

LONDON, August 22.—The incipient revolt of the Irish members of parliament, resulting from the veto by the House of Lords of the evicted tenants bill, has, it is reported, been quelled by Chief Secretary Morley. Suspicion has been rife among the Irish members that the government was working with the Conservatives for the postponement of the House of Lords' vote, but this suspicion was declared to be baseless by both Morley and the Conservative leader, Mr. Balfour, in the House of Commons last evening. The Times referring to the matter, says, "Few people believe that it was more than a sham fight, done for the purpose of cooling the Irish extremists in the belief that the Irish members are not the servile tools of the government."

SPRINGFIELD, MASS., Aug. 22.—Three new bicycle records were made on Hampden park this afternoon by members of the Bantler's team. J. P. Bliss made his half mile, flying start, in 54 1/2 seconds, the latter a half mile standing start in 58 1/2. The old records were 55 and 59 1/2 seconds. Marsden and Giles took to the road. Elmer the first half mile on a tandem, made a new mark for that machine, 54 2/5 seconds.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—A despatch from Shanghai says Chinese papers contain reports of a battle near Yang Yan, in which 25,000 men on each side were engaged. The Chinese, the despatch adds, claim the victory. But reliable confirmation of the report is wanting. Li Hung Chang has ordered the mobilization of the northern, southern and central Chinese fleets in the Gulf of Pe Chi Li. The Chinese fleet is conveying a number of troops and supplies from Taku to Port Arthur. Japanese nobles have subscribed the sum of \$50,000,000 (?) as a fund to be used in the prosecution of the war. This fund draws no interest.
