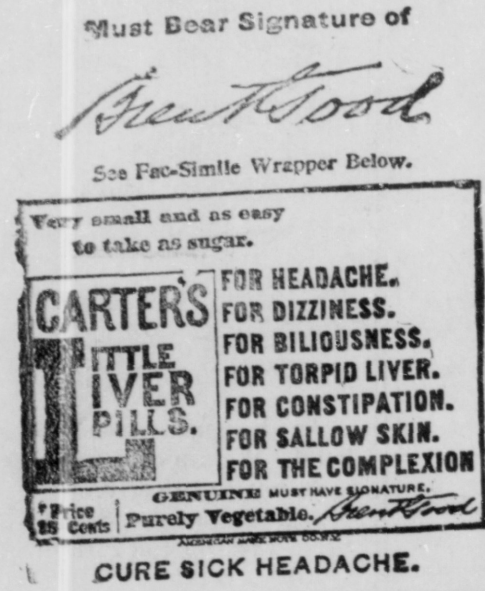

SEPTEMBER 8, 1900. SIR LOUIS AND THE N. P.

IN 1896, February 28th, Sir Louis Davies said in the House of Commons:

SIR LOUIS' ARRAIGNMENT. "I submit that Protection has blighted our trade and commerce; it has produced stagnation and commercial atrophy in the Maritime Provinces, at least; it has caused an alarming exodus of our population; it has helped to destroy our shipping interests; it has depreciated our farming lands; it has caused an unfair distribution of wealth; it has encouraged extravagant expenditure, with all its attendant evils; it has prevented us enjoying the cheap goods of the world, while we have to sell our surplus productions in the cheap markets; it unjustly levies unnecessary taxation for the development of special industries without compensating the people taxed; and it has discriminated against British trade."

In support of this indictment the Patriot declared on the 21st of May, 1896—"The National Policy has been a dead failure—that is to make the masses rich. It has made a few bloated combinesters millionaires; but at the same time it has made farmers, fishermen and mechanics poorer. It has been a veritable tax curse."

SIR LOUIS' PLEDGES TO THE PEOPLE.

The clear inference from the above is that if the Liberals were triumphant in the contest of 1896, Protection in Canada would be destroyed forthwith. But the matter was not left to inference. Sir Louis Davies came home from Ottawa at the close of the session of 1896, and he held a meeting in the Market Hall, on the 30th of April, 1896. The following are quotations from the shorthand report of the speech he delivered upon that occasion.

"If we were to start afresh in the Dominion, the Liberal Party would go for practical Free Trade."—Sir Louis Davies in Market Hall, in 1896.

"We desire to eliminate the protective system as far as possible and to return entirely and simply to a revenue tariff."—Sir Louis Davies in Market Hall in 1896.

"I tell you there is much at stake. There is economical government, there is honest government and honest tariff."—Sir Louis Davies in Market Hall in 1896.

Subsequently in the Opera House, Sir Louis Davies is reported by the Patriot to have said:

"The Liberal policy is a tariff for revenue only; they believe the requirements of the country can be met with a twenty per cent. tariff, instead of a 31 per cent. tariff as at present; and any manufacturer that cannot thrive under a 20 per cent. tariff deserves to die."—Sir Louis Davies, in Opera House, June 17, 1896.

NOT FULFILLED.

No one will now say that the existing tariff, readjusted by Mr. Fielding, is not a protective tariff, as practically and really as it was a protective tariff in 1896. No one will say that the system of Protection has been eliminated. No one can say, truthfully, that the promises of Sir Louis in this regard have been fulfilled. The protective duties are, in point of fact, within a fraction of a fraction of being as high as ever they were, even though, increased activity of trade has resulted in the collection by the government, of \$11,000,000 more taxes per year.

EXTRAVAGANT EXPENDITURES.

It will be observed that, in the course of his indictment, Sir Louis Davies speaks of the inducements to extravagant expenditures; and at Kentville, in 1896, Sir Louis Davies said:

"The Liberals attack the protective policy because it generates reckless extravagance."

At the Market Hall, in 1896, Sir Louis Davies declared that:

"It is said by those who know best that an economical expenditure will result in the cutting down of three or four millions."

And again Sir Louis said: "I think from three to four millions expenditure can be saved.—Sir L. H. Davies, Market Hall, 1896." When supporting Sir Louis, in 1896, The Patriot instituted elaborate comparisons to show that "the expenditure of the Dominion was \$14,628,847 greater in 1895 than in 1878," and conveyed to the public the impression that this was an enormous increase which would at once be stopped when the Liberals reached office. But the public accounts show that in the past four years, the Government's expenditures have, actually, by the mismanagement and extravagance of the deceivers in office, risen from \$41,000,000 to \$51,000,000, in round numbers; and if the money votes passed at the last session

of Parliament are all paid, the yearly expenditures of the Government will, in five years, have been increased by \$15,000,000, as against an increase of \$14,628,847, said to have taken place under the Conservatives in seventeen years.

A CHALLENGE.

Now, we note that Sir Louis Davies is to begin his campaign at Summerside on Monday evening; and, speaking for the people, we challenge him then and there to explain why the promises and pledges he has made have not been fulfilled, and why he was honest or dishonest, or dishonest when he denounced the National Policy of his predecessors? We point to all events admit, now, that his predecessors were right and he wrong; for the Government of which he is a member has adopted the National Policy.
