N. B. and P. E. Island Methodist Conference.

(Special Correspondence of the Examiner.)

SIXTH DAY.

After devotions, the banquet left by the will of the late J. L. Marsh was held over, to be dealt with by the conference of 1881.

Report of the Educational Society was read and approved. Dr. Stewart made some remarks and suggestions for the purpose of showing how the income might be increased.

On the recommendation of a request from the Fredericton district, it was decided to prepare a circuit book which would give all necessary information respecting births, marriages, deaths, removals, &c.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN AND SECRETARIES.

All the chairmen were elected on the first ballot. Rev. D. D. Currie was elected for the St. John district, the ex-President having next highest number of votes.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

After devotional exercises, the Report of the Fire Relief Committee of St. John was received. The total received from outside contributions was reported to be \$25,639.85 which had been expended as below:

The report made special reference to the services of the late Rev. Joseph Hart, as Secretary, of the Fund, and to the services of Hon. Mr. Lewin, as Treasurer.

The report of the Committee on travelling expenses was received. Dr. Stewart read the Pastoral address, which was somewhat lengthy but very good. It was passed.

Report of the Board of Examiners was read and passed. A brief conversation took place in reference to the general Conference Collection, which had not been taken up on all the circuits. It was ordered to be taken up in the month of August.

A second ballot elected the Rev. R. Duncan to a seat on the Central Missionary Board, the President having the next highest number of votes.

EVENING SESSION.

After devotions, the Children's Fund report was received, and, after considerable discussion, it passed without alteration.

Then the nominating Committee reported the formation of the various Committees for the ensuing year. Rev. Mr. Tweedy, expressing himself as unable to work the circuit to which he was appointed, requested that part of it be transferred to an adjoining circuit.

MINISTERS AND TOBACCO.

A strongly-worded resolution unanimously passed by the Sackville District, brought this subject fully before the Conference. The purport of the resolution was that every minister be prohibited from using tobacco.

SACKVILLE INSTITUTIONS.

At the request of the Conference, Rev. C. H. Paisley, A. M., of the Boys' Academy, was requested to say something about his work. He said that the last year had been a very satisfactory one.

Dr. Stewart next addressed the Conference. In flattering terms he spoke of the work done in the Ladies' Academy, under the direction of Dr. Kennedy.

After devotional exercises, a minute was passed respecting the Book Room affairs, and ordered to be placed in the minutes. It expressed gratitude for the labor of Dr. Pickard, and while recognizing the present gravity of the position looked hopefully to the future.

SEVENTH DAY.

After devotional exercises, a minute was passed respecting the Book Room affairs,

TEMPERANCE QUESTION.

Which, after a slight alteration, was unanimously passed. It hailed with satisfaction any efforts that would rid our land of the monster evil of intemperance, and pledged the Conference and the members of the Church to united and earnest action in the direction of passing the Scott Act or any other Act that would have the effect of lessening the evils of intemperance.

In answer to the question, where shall the next Conference be held? and after the respective claims of Saint Stephen and Moncton had been duly canvassed, the vote was given in favor of Moncton. It was resolved to meet the 4th Wednesday in June.

A lengthy conversation ensued upon the security of investments of the Supernumerary Fund; and an explanation was given which seemed to give general satisfaction.

LOYALTY.

Just as the guns fired at noon on Dominion day, some members of the Conference commenced to sing "God Save the Queen." Instantly the Conference rose, and after heartily singing the National hymn, proceeded with its business.

Rev. Dr. Pope was unanimously elected to represent the Conference at the Ecumenical Conference to be held in City Road Church, London, in the fall of '81.

A resolution was passed, appointing a committee to meet during the year and to report to next Conference upon the advisability or otherwise of uniting with the Nova Scotia Conference. A great deal of routine business was disposed of during the afternoon session.
