

Jr. Habs To Play At Ottawa In Amateur And Pro Leagues

MONTREAL (CP)—The Montreal Canadiens will make their home next season on a dual role by playing in amateur and professional leagues.

The arrangement was completed at Saturday's meeting of the Quebec Hockey League. The plan was devised by Sammy Pollock, director of the junior farm clubs for the parent Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League.

The new Ottawa Canadiens will continue to play in the Laurier Cup series, against Junior "A" clubs of the Ontario Hockey Association. When they play in the professional QHL, they will be reinforced by half a dozen more players—standby pros and over-age juniors. Both groups will be made available to the team by the parent organization.

Only junior-age players will make up the team in Laurier Cup competition and the Ottawa Canadiens will also retain their eligibility for Memorial Cup play within the framework of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

NOT IN PLAYOFFS

The team will have no official standing in the QHL inasmuch as it will not be eligible for QHL playoffs. Points will count unofficially for all other teams in the circuit.

Canadiens will play 28 games next season in the Laurier Cup series, making the Junior "A" Ontario circuit and playing all home games at the Ottawa Auditorium.

In the QHL the hybrid team will play only 20 games—10 at home and 10 on the road.

Sime Breaks 220 Record

SANGER, Calif. (AP)—Duke Sime broke the 220-yard dash world record for the 220-yard dash Saturday, running the distance in 20.2 seconds flat in the Central California track and field meet.

Minutes earlier Sime had tied the world record of 9.3 seconds in the 100-yard dash.

Official world record for the 220 is 20.2 seconds set by Mel Patton of southern California in 1949. However, Sime had run the distance earlier this year in '50.

Officials said the aiding wind in Saturday's races was within permissible limits and the 220 record will be submitted as an official mark.

Jack Davis of the U. S. Navy tied the world record of 13.5 in the 120-yard high hurdles.

The third and final combined Lieut. Col. D.A. MacKinnon Sponoff and inter-Maritime qualifying shoot was held Saturday afternoon at Squaw Point Range, with the attendance down slightly from the previous week. Top marksman and winner of the MacKinnon spoon for the best senior was Alexander schoolmarm Lieutenant Mary MacLennan who finished with 103 two points short of a possible. Mary's individual scores for each of the ranges were: 200 yards, 34; 500, 35; and 600, 34. The best tyro shot for the day was Lieut. D.B. MacBeath who, with a score of 99, was the recipient of the second MacKinnon spoon.

Leonard Cops Quebec Meet

MONTREAL (CP)—Stan Leonard, who now plays out of the nearby Lachute club, came from the warm-weather golf trail in the south to win the Quebec professional golf tournament Friday with a 36-hole score of 139, three under par.

Leonard, former Vancouver marine drive professional, outclassed a starting field of 57 and was the only man under par when play ended in near darkness.

Leonard shot a par-71 in the morning round and cracked par by three strokes in the afternoon.

The Cincinnati Redlegs' first place lead was trimmed down to more percentage points Sunday as only two games separated the first five clubs in the National League. In the American League, the New York Yankees opened up a 3 1/2 game margin over Cleveland, salvaging the finale of the three-game series from the Indians 6-0.

Brooklyn, in fifth place, knocked off the Redlegs 8-6 to win its second straight over the team which had beaten the Dodgers five straight times. The Brooks triumph moved them into a virtual fourth place tie with Milwaukee and sliced Cincinnati's lead over St. Louis to three percentage points—583 to 580.

The Cardinals picked up a half game on the Redlegs, by splitting a pair with Pittsburgh Pirates, who won the opener 11-3. The Cards, behind Herm Wehmeier's six-hitter, captured the nightcap 5-0. Pittsburgh, in first place for a couple of hours, dropped back into third place, a half game behind the pace-setters.

The New York Giants came from behind to whip Milwaukee 5-3 and gain the rubber of the three-game set. The Braves trail the pack by two games and hold only a seven point lead over the Dodgers.

CUBS TAKE BOTH

The Chicago Cubs climbed within a half game of the sixth place Giants by sweeping both ends of a doubleheader from the cellar-dwelling Philadelphia Phillies: 2-1 in 12 innings and 5-2.

Chicago's third place White Sox advanced to within a half game of the Indians with a 3-2 triumph over Boston. Washington knocked Detroit out of a fourth place tie by downing the Tigers twice 6-5 and 12-9 while Kansas City defeated Baltimore 7-3.

Joe Collins' three-run homer and Johnny Kucks' nine-hit pitching combined to pre-empt the Indians from sweeping the entire set against New York. Bob Lemon, in quest of his eighth victory, was charged with his third defeat.

Billy Pierce doled out six hits and fanned seven to record his eighth victory in 10 decisions as the White Sox capitalized on a break to score all their runs in one inning. After a routine pop fly by Nelle Fox fell safely for a double to open the fourth, successive singles by Minnie Minoso, Larry Doby and Dave Philley followed and the Sox had all the runs they needed to beat George Susce.

Enos Slaughter slammed a pinch hit double to start Kansas City on a three-run rally in the sixth and the Athletics went on to snap a five-game losing streak as well as Baltimore's four-game winning streak. Jim Lemon singled to drive in the tying and winning runs in the ninth inning of the opener and slammed a two-run homer in the first inning of the nightcap as Washington ended the Tiger jinx. Detroit had beaten the Nats six straight times before Sunday's game.

The Dodgers rapped five Cincinnati hurriers for 15 hits, including home runs by Randy Jackson and Charley Neal.

Swaps Sets World Record Of 1:33 1-5 In Winning Handicap

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Swaps, the 1955 Kentucky Derby winner, set a world record of 1:33 1-5 for the mile Saturday in winning the Argonaut Handicap at Hollywood Park.

Jockey Willie Shoemaker took Rexworth's colt from the rail position to a wire-to-wire victory to break the record of 1:33 3-5 set by Citation at Golden Gate Fields in 1950.

Swaps now holds three world records. He set the mark for the mile and 70 yards at Gulfstream in Florida in April and established the record for the mile and a sixteenth in the Californian on the track here.

Bobby Brocato was second, a length behind Swaps, and Porterhouse, who nipped Swaps at the wire two weeks ago in the Californian, was third.

Swaps won \$29,750 and paid \$2.40, \$2.20 and \$2.10. Bobby Brocato returned \$2.80 and \$2.30 and Porterhouse \$2.30.

Quebec Pros Whip Ontario In Inter-Provincial Golf

MONTREAL (CP)—Quebec professional golfers today defeated a team of Ontario pros in the first interprovincial tournament, the eight-man Quebec squad winning decisively, eight points to four.

Little Johnny Henrick of the Ottawa Gatineau Club, on the Quebec side across from the capital, and Bob Dean of Cornwall, Ont., were the only pair to make a clean sweep, posting three points in the Quebec cause. Dean's club at Cornwall is within Quebec golf jurisdiction.

Henrick and Dean took both finishes in the 18-hole play from Bill Kozak of St. Catharines and Hal Butler of Oshawa.

The match that brought together two of Canada's top pros—Al Baldi of Toronto and Stan Leonard, now playing out of the Lachute, Que., club—swung in favor of Ontario.

It was the only match in which an Ontario pair finished ahead on points, Baldi and veteran Bob Burns taking 2 1/2 of the possible and Rudy Huot of Royal Quebec.

The 16 players, in four foursomes, played best-ball style at match play. Two players from each province were in each foursome. One point was counted for the first nine, another point for the second nine and a final point for the over-all 18-hole result.

The matches were played over a soggy course following morning rain. The winning Quebec team was presented with the Dow Interprovincial Trophy.

Jack Kay, of the Montreal mount Bruno Club and Jim Seenev, of St. Andrews, Que., were tied after the first nine with Norm Hunt of Toronto Golf Club and Norm Smith of Toronto York Downs, but the Quebec pair went onto take the second nine by two holes, and collect 2 1/2 points to only one-half for the Ontario team.

Bill Kerr of Montreal Reascfield, and Pat Fletcher, formerly of Saskatoon and now of Royal Montreal, took two of the three points from Murray Tucker of Toronto Rosefield and Gordie Brydson of Toronto Mississauga.

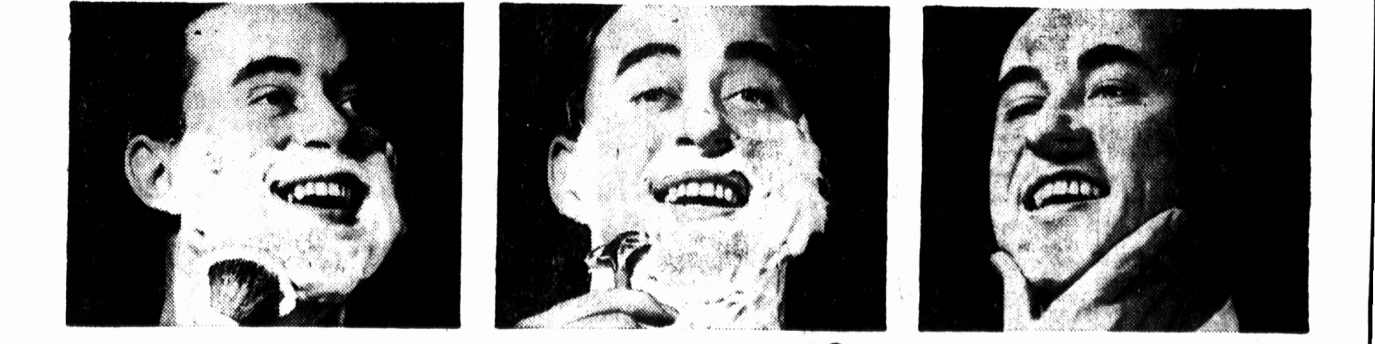
Voio, owned by Prescott Harvey of Windsor, N. S., won the three-quarter and mile dashes, doing the mile in 2:16 2/5.
