MONTREAL

MONTREAL (CP) — Prices were irregularly lower in fairly active trading Tuesday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.

The utilities were generally higher. Up 1/2 were Newfoundland Light at 49 1/2, Shawinigan at 33, a new high, and Canadian International Power at 25.

The papers were generally lower. Off 1/2 were Powell River at 37 1/2 and Price Bros at 46 1/2. International lost 1/2 at 106 1/2.

The base metals were lower with Nickel down 1/2 at 83 1/2 and Aluminum off 1 at 29 1/2.

The steels were eased. In other issues traded Marconi lost 40 cents at 48 1/2, Celanese gained 1/2 at 19 1/2, and Dominion Stores was up 1 at 81, a new high.

The mines and oils were generally lower. The closing averages show banks up .14 at 58.87, utilities up .3 at 150.4, industrials off 1.4 at 263.4, combined off .9 at 245.7, papers off .3 at 452.2 and golds off .51 at 81.22.

NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) — A three-day advance in stock prices came to a halt Tuesday as the market retreated for minor losses. It was not an unexpected decline to security analysts who had predicted some consolidation of the price rise.

Steels, metals, rails, chemicals, aircrafts and oils were uniformly lower. There were some gains in motors, electronics and building materials.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 60 cents to \$304.50.

Aluminum Ltd.'s 1-point loss was the biggest in the Canadian section. Dome Mines added 3/4 and Canadian Pacific, International Nickel and Hudson Bay Mining were all down.

Canadian shares on the American Exchange dipped small fractions or held even. Molycbdenite made a minor gain.

A delegation from the CTF, winding up a two-day meeting here, urged the federal government to support financially a national alcoholism research organization, amend the Criminal Code to strengthen existing provisions for the use of chemical tests in court evidence, and clamp down on liquor trade advertising.

Rev. William Potorka of Winnipeg told the cabinet group headed by acting prime minister Green that the conscience and concern of all Canadians is for the study and prevention of alcoholism.

He said the government would find "no controversy" over research, rehabilitation and possibly education on the subject. Five provinces had accepted increasing responsibility for alcohol study, treatment and some research.

But federal funds were needed to tackle the research job on an effective national-wide basis.

Dr. John Linton, CTF general secretary, said some studies suggest alcohol is the major contributor to the problem with Washington.

Ch'town Youths Get Suspended One Year Terms

Two Douglas Street youths were each given one-year suspended sentences when they appeared in Charlottetown Police Court Tuesday morning charged with theft.

The two pleaded guilty Monday morning to the charge which arose out of the theft of an auto battery and car radio aerial.

Each was ordered to post peace bonds of \$300.

A King Street man, appearing for the second straight day in court on separate charges of being drunk and incapable, was sentenced to 10 days in jail.
