

# PEI Hogs Outstanding, Complete Results Indicate

Complete results received from the All Canada Swine Show at Brandon, Manitoba bring further indication of outstanding success scored by some of the Prince Edward Island Breeders and Showmen.

Perhaps the outstanding performance was the winning of third place by Sterling Willis of Cornwall in the Premier Exhibition competition. Mr. Willis had a total of 268 points to place him third in all Canada, a remarkable performance.

This was in addition to the reserve senior and reserve grand championship he scored with his sow Kingston Lady 39 H. He won

the reserve prize in a special for the breeders herd.

He placed 4th in the competition for senior herd a hurried check indicates he won sixteen prizes in all with his hogs.

The Island breeders placed third in the Provincial herd competition.

The Prince Edward Island Swine Breeders Association was awarded a prize of one hundred dollars for the entry coming the longest distance to the show. The Island entry was selected and shipped under the sponsorship of the local association.

Almon Boswall of Dunstaffnage also had some very fine individual pascings. His six-month old sows

placed third and fourth in their class, and his young sows placed fifth and tenth (All of the classes were large and no less than twenty placings were made in each case).

Mr. Boswall's entries placed fifth in breeding sow class, 13th in slow six to nine month, tenth in the junior herd competition.

Mr. Willis sold his reserve grand champion sow for \$330 and another hog for \$170.

Mr. Boswall sold a young boar for \$325.

N. W. MacLeod and Son of Bridgetown and William Found of Long River sold hogs for \$95 each. The average price of the eighty-three Canadian Yorkshires sold was \$119.60.

# Appointed Supervisor Of Co-operatives In PEI

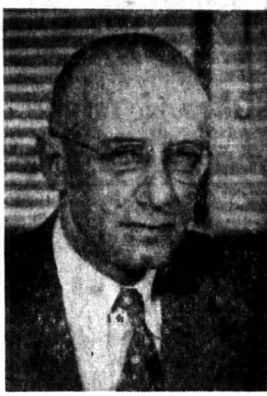
Mr. J. G. Dennis of Charlottetown has recently been appointed Supervisor of Co-operatives for the Province. The Guardian learned last night from Hon. B. Earle MacDonald, Provincial Secretary - Treasurer.

Mr. Dennis brings to the position a great deal of experience as he has been closely associated with co-operative work for many years.

He was supervisor of Co-operatives and Inspector of Credit Unions for the provincial government from 1940 to 1946. At that time he took a position as Managing Director of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League and Secretary of the Co-operative Union of Prince Edward Island. He served in that capacity until 1955.

Mr. Dennis was National Director of the Credit Union National Association representing Prince Edward Island for some eight years. He was director and treasurer of Cuna Supply Company representing Canada for three years. He was born at O'Leary and was educated in the public school there and at Prince of Wales College. He was with the Bank of Nova Scotia from 1923 to 1929 and was in the general office of the T. Eaton Company at Moncton from 1929 until 1940 when he first became associated with the work of the co-operatives as a supervisor for the government.

His present job entails general supervision of co-operative units in the Province.

# Survey Ship Baffin Beached

HALIFAX (CP) — The sturdy hydrographic ship Baffin, leaking and listing, was beached on a south coast island Wednesday so repairmen could prepare her for a 70-mile trip to Halifax.

There were hopes the \$4,000,000 ship, which ran onto dangerous Black Rock, near the mouth of the LaHave River last Thursday, may start here today, but whether she will travel under her own power was not known Wednesday night.

The Baffin, loaded down with electronic equipment, sounding barges and helicopters, was freed from her rock bed late Tuesday when she strained on her own winches as two high powered tugs pulled her away from the part-

# Fredericton Farmer Loses Three Buildings By Fire Yesterday

A Fredericton farmer, Boyd Weeks, lost three outbuildings by fire this morning in a blaze which broke out about nine o'clock.

The Kensington fire department answered a call for help and were able to prevent further damage. Week's house caught but in both cases the fire was quickly brought under control, it was learned last night.

The Charlottetown Fire Department also went to the scene but

action was just about over when they arrived. They used their Bickle pumper with its some 250-gallon capacity, to wet down the fire and prevent a new outbreak.

The buildings Mr. Weeks lost, were a large barn, a machine shed and a sheep shed.

There were no livestock in the barn and the machinery was removed from the shed before the fire became too hot to prevent such action.

# Recover Body Of Drowning Victim

The body of Dewar Jones, who lost his life by drowning at Stanhope on Tuesday, was recovered yesterday by a mixed group of R.C.M.P. officers, fishermen from Covehead Harbor and other city men including a number of employees from Dowd Motors where the deceased had been a mechanical sub-foreman. During part of the time, a young man, Dave Laughton who is vacationing on the island equipped himself with an aqua lung and gave assistance in the search.

The body was found at approximately the same spot at which the victim disappeared. The water at that point was about 15 feet deep. Royal Canadian Mounted Police resumed their search at 4:00 a.m. yesterday morning and were joined by others during the day. Six sets of grappling hooks were made available to the party.

Coroner L.E. Prowse after viewing the body and learning the circumstances under which death occurred, decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

# Halifax Club Addressed By Mr. Heath Macquarrie

Mr. Heath Macquarrie, Queens County M.P., addressed the regular luncheon meeting of the Halifax Kiwanis club this week taking as his topic "Focus on Foreign Policy." Mr. Macquarrie traced the history of international organization through various phases which led to the elaborate and specialized League of Nations and its successor, the United Nations.

Although recognizing some aspects of the UN's program have been highly successful and of great benefit to mankind the speaker cautioned against expecting the UN to deal with problems which are more appropriately

handled by other diplomatic means.

Mr. Macquarrie, a former professor of political science and international relations and currently third vice-president of the Progressive Conservative party of Canada, referred also to Canada's foreign policy. The present move toward closer attention to the Canadian role in the British Commonwealth he hailed as one of the most encouraging recent developments.

Mr. Macquarrie was introduced by Mr. John Walker, a former cabinet minister in the Nova Scotia government.
