Mr. MacLaren was born at Birchfield Farm, Georgetown Royalty, in 1869, and is still keenly active physically and mentally despite his years. He was a former member of the Soldier Settlement Board and afterwards was named valuator of farms under the Farm Credit Rearrangement Act. Mr.

MacLaren was also for a long time, director of the P. E. I. Potato Growers' Association and served on the Board for 26 years, ten years as President, during which time the Association had cleared itself of all indebtedness. In 1936 he also served on the Board under the P. E. I. Assignment Act as representative of the farmers, a period during which he made many friends throughout the Province. As a practical farmer, he was one of the first on the Island to use commercial fertilizer when he applied it in 1903, after getting a formula from Mr. F. T. Shutt, then head chemist at Ottawa. He obtained excellent results, and continued its use until the First World War, building up one of the finest farms in the community.
