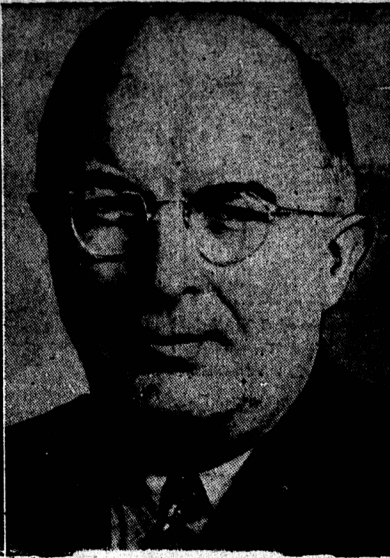

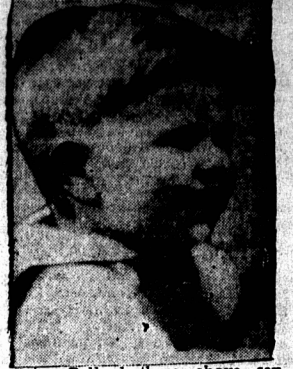

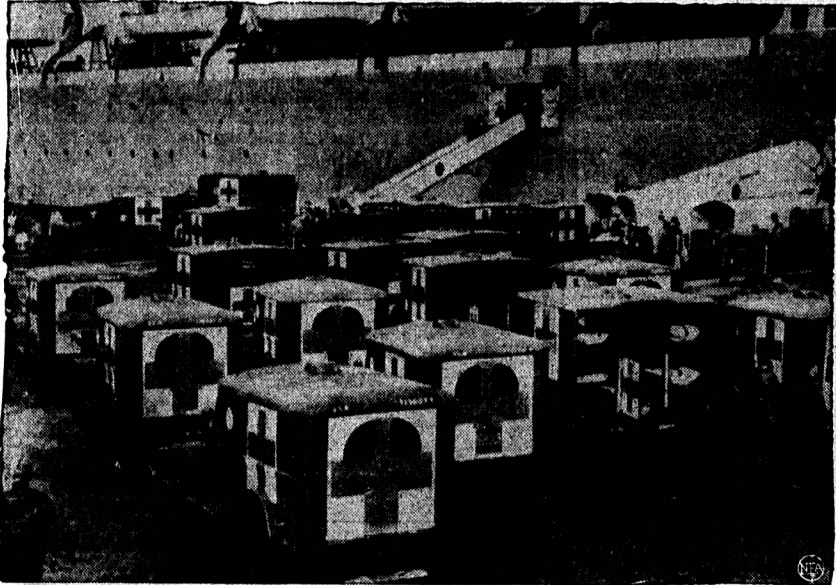

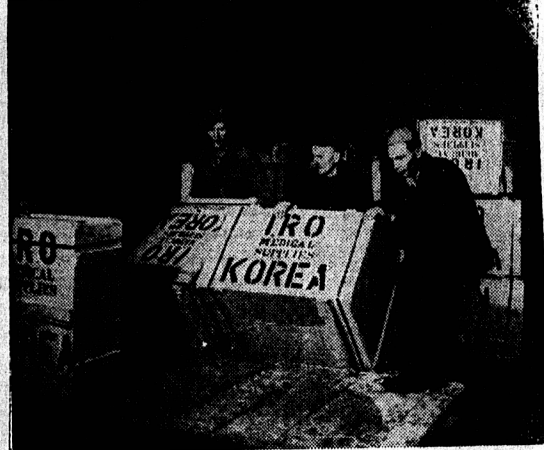

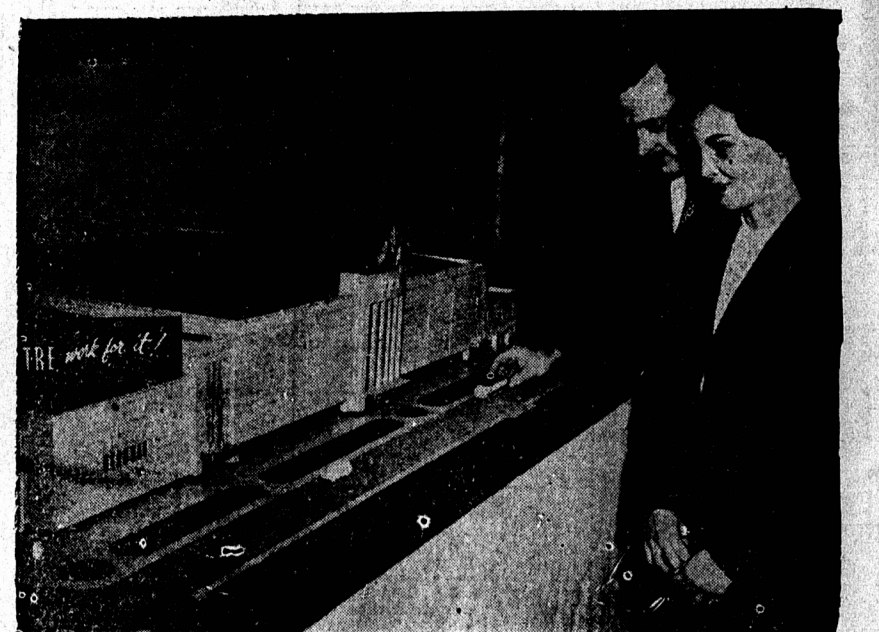
VICTIM IS SEEN WITH SON — Dr. James D. Grievie, 43, psychiatrist and former Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps major and director of the mental health clinic at the Ontario hospital, in Hamilton, Ont., was killed when his automobile was in a head-on collision with a 10-ton transport tractor trailer unit, Allan Johnson, 21, of Waterloo, has been arrested on a charge of dangerous driving. Police said the westbound transport apparently pulled out to pass a car and collided with the east-bound auto. Force of the impact locked the two vehicles together.
