Public Meeting at Fort Augustus.

ACCORDING to previous notice a meeting of the electors of Fort Augustus, and adjacent settlements, was held at the Schoolhouse near Smith's Corner, on Thursday evening the 16th inst. Lucius O. Kelly Esq., presided.

ROBERT SHAW, Esq., one of the representatives of the district who called the meeting, was the first to address the electors. He reviewed the acts and policy of the present Government since they came into power two years ago; and very tersely asserted his reasons for leaving the Government and joining the Opposition. He said for the first year after his election he was quite satisfied with the course the Sullivan Administration pursued, but since then owing to the unsystematic manner in which they pressed the Island claims to the Fishery Award, their imposition of additional taxes on the rate-payers this year, and Hon. W. W. Sullivan's cold indifference to him he decided to sever his connection with him and join the Opposition. Mr. Shaw highly eulogized L. H. Davies for his legal ability and accuracy. He said Hon. Mr. Sullivan also possessed rare and unmistakable legal acquirements. Both of these gentlemen as Attorney General, had given as their opinion that this Province was legally entitled to \$1,250,000, as a just and equitable share of the Fishery Award. He believed that when the Island was legally entitled to that amount, the proper course was to apply to the Dominion Court of Appeal, and exact our rights according to the due form of the law. This, the present administration had failed to do. Mr. Shaw censured the Government for issuing precepts from the Land Office against the poor tenantry and also condemned the exorbitant compound interest system practised in that department. Mr. Shaw made a polished and spirited speech, but failed to convince the electors that he had sufficient reason for leaving the Government.

DONALD D. McDONALD, Esq., M. P., for the district, was the next speaker. He said he was returned to support the present Government, according to principles set forth in Hon. Mr. Sullivan's Card to the electors; and he had done so. He never had any reasons to warrant him in withdrawing his support. He believed the present administration were sincere in the interests of the people, and were practising prudence and economy in every department of the public service. And, so long as they were doing so, he would give them his hearty support. Mr. McDonald then briefly referred to some of the leading acts of the present Government. He said he would leave Mr. Shaw to Hon. Mr. Ferguson's treatment. Mr. McDonald then requested any of the electors present to state their views, as he would be very

happy to hear any suggestions they might offer with regard to the local wants or improvements of the district. Mr. McDonald's remarks were plain, simple and to the point.

HON. D. FERGUSON, being called upon, next addressed the meeting, and vigorously defended the present Government and showed where they had economized in several departments, by the amalgamation of offices and in the reduction of officials' salaries; and asserted that the Government were using every legitimate means in their power to induce the Dominion Government to pay us our rights in the Fishery Award, and then, if that failed, they had the just but unpleasant course of the law to resort to. He believed that when dealing with honest men, people often fared better by not going to law. He said that owing to the destruction of public property by the storm in the Autumn of 1879, the Government had to resort to a little additional taxation, in order to keep the revenue of the Province within the expenditure. Concerning the charges brought against the Government with regard to the Land Office, he, as head of that Department, was only following the judicious course of his predecessor. He defied any man to show where he had used harsh or oppressive measures against any tenant. As a matter of fact, proceedings had not been taken against a single individual who had paid a cent of either interest or principal within the past ten years. The mode of calculating interest in the Land Office was the same as practised by successive administrations since it was opened. An animated discussion then took place between Mr. Shaw and Hon. Mr. Ferguson, in which a good deal of sarcasm was indulged in. Mr. Ferguson's defense was conclusive. He fully rebutted every one of Mr. Shaw's charges. Mr. Ferguson fully sustained his high and well merited reputation as a speaker and a politician.

MR. JAS. H. CUMMISKEY offered a few curt and appropriate remarks; after which the following resolution was proposed by Mr. Francis Quinn, senr., Monaghan, and seconded by Mr. William G. Brazil, Johnson's River.

Resolved, That this meeting endorses the policy of the present Government, and disapproves of Mr. Shaw's conduct in withdrawing his support from the party he was returned to support. Carried unanimously.

A vote of thanks was then tendered to the Chairman for his proficiency in the chair, to which Mr. Kelly replied in a suitable manner.

Messrs. Shaw and Ferguson then paid a high tribute of respect to the large audience for their order and deportment. Both affirmed that it was the most orderly and well conducted meeting ever they had the pleasure of attending.

Fort Augustus, Dec. 18th, 1880.

These were on guard two days and a night, therefore it must be supposed that half were reliefs. The cost of the watchmen, including the journey to Livadia in the summer, is estimated to have been £15,000.

A very beautiful memorial of the disaster at Cabul, in which Cavignani and so many other gallant fellows fell, has just been placed in the chapel of Felstead School. It is a stained glass window, designed to commemorate Lieutenant Hamilton, V. C., a former pupil at the college, who fell while leading one of the last desperate charges of the beleaguered men from the Embassy.

Count Gleichen has almost completed the bust of Lord Beaconsfield for the club named after the illustrious statesman. It is a wonderful likeness, and by the Queen's wish the bust is a replica of the one done by Count Gleichen for Her Majesty.
