

Holman's Upset Abbies 9-5 To Win League Series

Holman's Intermediates ousted the Intermediate Abbies from the Island Baseball League playdowns yesterday afternoon by defeating the City squad 9-5 for a stunning upset in the final game of the best-of-three series.

Holman's, the cellar dwellers in the Island League all year, came off the deck yesterday to hand Donnie MacLean his season's first defeat as they shelled the big right-hander for 12 base hits.

Be-spectacled Donnie Simmons, his fast ball blazing and his curves breaking sharply, held the hard-hitting Abbies to two earned runs as he pitched Holman's into the League semi-finals.

Holman's will play M. C. A. here Wednesday night in a sudden-death semi-final game. The contest will be underway at 7:30. The winners will meet the C. & B. Juniors in the finals.

Holman's socked MacLean's offerings for seven hits and eight runs in a big fifth inning. They scored their only other run of the game in the second.

But only for two stellar defensive plays on the part of the Abbies they would have scored earlier in the game. Twice they had runners on second and third only to see them get trapped off base by the Abbies infield.

However the dam broke in the fifth. Centrefielder Jimmy Grady opening the inning with a triple into deep right field. Before the inning was over he was back again to drive home Gil Williams with a single.

Following Grady's triple MacLean issued walks to Doucette and Simmons. Bernard sacrificed Grady home and then Mitchell Gay and Gallant hit back to back singles.

Gillis fled out but Gil Williams kept the rally going with a double. Jimmy Grady followed with his single, his second hit of the inning after which Doucette drew a walk and Simmons hit a single. Bernard grounded out to end the inning.

The Abbies scored single runs in the third, fourth, sixth, seventh and eighth innings. Cuker Pineau led the Abbies with three singles. Charlie Kennedy and Charlie Ryan each had two.
