S'side Academy Assembly Meeting

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Carleton Siding Farmer Injured In Fall Into Well

Mr. John Haslam of Carleton Siding is a patient in the Prince County Hospital as a result of a fall into a well at his farm in Carleton. Mr. Haslam had gone out to his well house to drain the taps as a precaution against frost. An electric pump in the well house which was sunk about eight feet below the floor is located in the building. The hatch covering the pump had been left open and Mr. Haslam had gone in without a light and fell head first into the well. He landed on his right shoulder and his right arm was broken in two places. It is believed that ball and socket joint at the shoulder also received somewhat serious injury. Last night he was resting as well as could be expected.

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Coleman Boy Injured In Road Accident

Francis Gallant, age 17 years, of Coleman is a patient in the Prince County Hospital as a result of being hit by a car on Saturday evening about five o'clock at New Annan. The young man had just left the store at New Annan to drive on his bicycle to the place where he worked and while driving along the chain came off the sprocket and he dismounted to fix it. His car, a 1948 Chevrolet coach driven by Mr. A. E. MacKay of Sea View proceeding along the highway struck him. He was rushed to the Prince County Hospital by ambulance. X-rays had not been taken up to last evening but it is believed that his leg was broken in two places and he also received minor face and head injuries.

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S'side Man Retires From Express Service

Mr. Francis M. Doyle has returned to his Province on his retirement as an Express Messenger of the Canadian National Railway after 44 years service. A native of Summerside, Mr. Doyle was born there in 1886 and joined the C. N. R. there in 1907. It was just 9 years later that he left to enlist in the First World War and in 1919 when he returned he re-entered the service of the C. N. R. operating as a messenger between Charlottetown and Summerside. In 1930 he was transferred to the Moncton-Saint John route and was there until his retirement. In reporting his retirement the Canadian National Magazine related how he was presented with a framed picture and a travelling clock by Mr. Bert Tyler, Express Agent of Saint John, on behalf of his fellow employees.

The following program of simple folk songs well loved in their native lands was presented: "Blow Ye Winds", a popular sea shanty sung by the fo'c'sle hands aboard a vessel; "La Laine Des Moutons" is sung by the French Canadians of the Gaspé, as they work at shearing the sheep; "Old Man Great Chief" is an authentic song of an American Indian sung to the beating of drums by the earliest inhabitants of our country; "Zulu Lullaby", a soft rocking rhythm of the lullaby in any language; "O, How the Moon is Shining", the sad, haunting music of the Slavic people and of the Polish people; "Swiftly Flowing Labe" is an old Czechoslovakian marching tune; "O, Won't You Sit Down?", a Negro Spiritual; "Kitty of Coleraine", the lilting music of Ireland was sung as a duet by Barbara Dalton and Lorraine Gaudet; "The Volga Boat Song", picturing the men straining at the ropes which pulled the boats down the rivers in Russia; "All Through the Night", a lively Welch tune written in the 17th century.

"Gaudemus Igitur" (Let us then be glad while we are young) a medieval Latin student's song; "Tra ra-Das Tent", a German hunting song; "The Keel Row", a traditional old melody from northern England; "From Lucerne", a Swiss mountain climber's song; "Greensleeves", an old 15th century English song which so pleased Queen Elizabeth that she ordered a special church service set to its music. Mr. J. H. Leuty was director and Mr. J. Chaisson was accompanist.
