

CRIME WAVE CAPITOL SUMMERSIDE

—Filmed in the actual Los Angeles locales, Warner Bros.' drama "Crime Wave", opens today at the Capitol Theatre. It stars Sterling Hayden, Gene Nelson and Phyllis Kirk in a story of the seamy criminal segment operating in the City of the Angels, and tells of the desperate efforts of an ex-convict to free himself from his sordid past.

Cast in the role of the ex-convict is Gene Nelson. Noted in the past for his nimble-footed dancing parts in gay musicals, Nelson is given the opportunity to display more dramatic ability in the role of a man caught in an emotional vise. "Crime Wave" marks Nelson's first straight acting role.

Sterling Hayden is seen as a hard-working, wily detective of the Los Angeles police force. His portrayal called for the display of a combination of brains and brawn. Hayden, who once brushed aside his screen stardom to return to his first love—the sea, plays the role of a veteran cop under the direction of Captain R. A. Lohrman of the Los Angeles police force.

The only woman appearing in "Crime Wave" in a stellar role is pretty Phyllis Kirk. The action of the film is revealed against the background of the efforts of Gene Nelson to thwart a major crime by a band of escaped convicts. The cops hold his wife as a hostage in order to insure his co-operation. "Crime Wave" was based on a story appearing in a national magazine.

Let's Talk It Over

The result of the Provincial Grade X examinations are out. Some people thought that, in view of the spirited controversy on educational matters last winter, the requirements for passing into Grade XI might be made a bit stiffer, but this raising of the bars did not materialize. If anything, the hurdle may have been lowered a little as approximately 70% of the students writing were successful, and this, we believe, is higher than the percentage in former years.

In recent years the system of publishing the names of successful candidates has been changed somewhat. Formerly each pupil's name appeared in the order of rank and total marks were appended. Now the pupils are grouped in three divisions and listed alphabetically. The system conforms pretty well to the way such lists are published in universities. The peculiarity of the Island method is that the names of the pupils who come first in separate subjects are published, while the student who amassed the highest aggregate is kept a secret. Surely this pupil who shows an all-round excellence deserves recognition more than the others.

When we come to the handling of Grade XI examination results, an abrupt change is noted. Those who make the highest percentage in individual subjects are now ignored, and the highest five on the Island are listed in order of merit. We think this system is an improvement over the one used for Grade X. If we are trying to do away with the idea of pupils competing against each other, then we are not going far enough. The ranking of pupils is still present, and it is now sometimes misleading. We know a boy who made 598 in this year's Grade X exams. This is just two marks away from the first class, but his name is listed in alphabetical order in the second class. He might be at the bottom of that class for all anyone could tell. The old system of publishing each aggregate in order is superior to this.
