# Thoughts For Our Time

**CHRIST EXEMPLIFIES TRUE FRIENDSHIP**

In the story of the Passion of  
Jesus Christ, there are two figures  
who cannot fail to attract our at-  
tention. Both are playing a role  
which we would not have expected  
them to play, the role of traitor.

Both were men who had been  
highly favored by their Master.  
Both, after their treachery, were  
very sorry for what they had done.  
But here is where the similarity  
between these two men ends.

One, overcome by the thought  
of his own despicable act, rushed  
away from the awful scene into  
what was thereafter to be called  
"The Field of Blood," and hanged  
himself with a halter—this was  
Judas. The other, though horri-  
fied at his own sin, knew the  
loving mercy of his Lord, and  
having obtained his forgiveness,  
lived on to lead the other  
Apostles in their evangelization  
of the world—this was Peter.

The difference between Peter  
and Judas was the difference be-  
tween hope and despair; and  
what a difference that made!  
Hope in a Christian is a virtue  
which is based upon his Faith,  
because it has its foundation in  
the knowledge he has of God's  
unlimited love and mercy, which  
is had by Faith.

Now Faith cometh by hear-  
ing," and on the very evening  
of their treachery both Peter and  
Judas had heard their Master tell  
them, "I will not now call you  
servants... But I have called you  
friends."

**TRUE FRIENDSHIP**

This friendship, to which He  
was calling them, was not the  
weak, insipid thing which the  
world has come to represent in  
our language today. Often when  
we speak of friends, we mean  
little more than acquaintances  
who have no antipathy toward us  
—but Jesus was speaking of  
friendship of a much truer kind,  
one which was intense, whole-  
hearted, capable of generous  
forgiveness, capable of generous  
sacrifice ("Greater love than this  
no man hath, that a man lay down  
his life for his friends").

God's offer of friendship with  
man is a distinctively Christian  
message. In earlier times, God  
was regarded, not so much as a  
Father to be revered and loved,  
as a Being to be the object of  
servile fear. Peter heard this  
message—Judas did not.

Christ's whole life was a con-  
crete demonstration of the love  
of God for men. No demands  
from the eager crowds were too  
great, no sacrifices were too hard  
to undergo, not even that last  
great sacrifice which epitomized  
and climaxed His life so perfectly.  
It was undoubtedly for this  
reason that His identity as Son  
of God remained hidden for a  
large part of His public life.

His wise plan was to draw the  
people to Himself first, and show  
them His love; and only after He  
had shown that there was no  
cause to fear did He gradually  
allow His identity to become  
known. As Frank Sheed has so  
aptly put it, he has been by  
simply stating who He was. His  
hearers, who, unlike many mod-  
erns, realized the enormity of

individuals, as families, and as  
nations, to this offer of friend-  
ship, the sooner we shall obtain  
that peace which the world can-  
not give.

problem of the Moncton police  
force.

Investigating crimes committed  
by youngsters takes up consider-  
able, and sometimes all, of the  
detective branch's time, he said.

constructed, at the city stadium  
and broken school windows were  
only some of the things that force  
the department to enforce strictly  
the curfew law banning children  
under 14 from the streets after nine  
o'clock.

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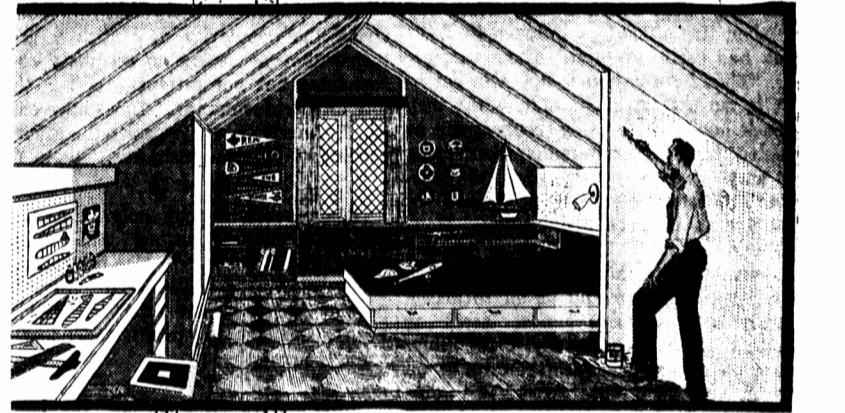
