Saints Trounce Mount A 80-56; 61 Fouls Called

Saint Dunstan's University basketball squad finalized their Maritime Intercollegiate play for the season by trouncing the Mount Allison hoopers from Sackville 80-56 in a four-riddled game at the SDU gymnasium last evening. The impressive win was taken as revenge for the Saints who had taken a defeat at the hands of Mounties earlier in the current season.

The Island's "Mr. Basketball", who has proved himself as such in recent years with the SDU hoopers, turned in a brilliant performance, racking up a total score of 28 points, the best of the night, in what was his last intercollegiate game with the Saints before he graduating this spring. "Moose" MacLennan, scoring sensation of the Garnet and Gold men, followed close behind Reardon in the scoring department with 23 points.

The game, which meant little to the league standings, was marred by some 60 odd foul calls by referees Don MacLean and Jack Ready, many of which were of a technical nature in regard to the Mounties. The official count on the infraction awards was 34 to the visitors and 27 to the Saints.

The teams battled neck and neck in the first half with the Mount A squad trailing the Saints by only four points at the midway mark when the score stood at 35-31 in favor of the hosts. MacLennan had a field day in scoring over half of his team's points, a total of 17. Reardon had 11. The Saints however were not content to hold a slim lead in the final half and with the addition of many fouls were able to open a commanding lead before the session had gone many minutes. Reardon alone scored 13 points on foul trays in the half.

John Kelly, Frank Slowe and "Irish" Bob Mooney played very well for the Saints while Lloyd MacEwen and Hugh MacDonald were strong competitors for the Mounties. Graham Langley, forward of the Mount A team, had

to be taken from the game being knocked unconscious when he slipped and hit his head on the hard-wood gymnasium floor during the opening half. He is reported to have received no serious injuries however.

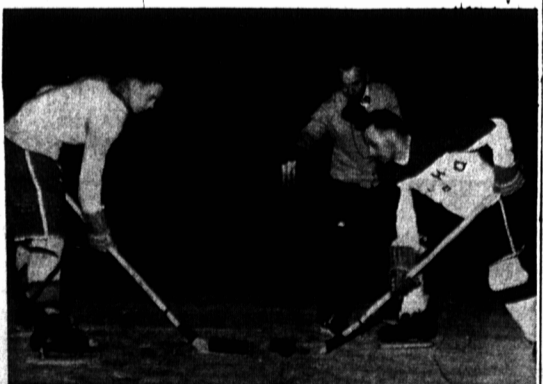

Welshmen Rink In Second Place Tie After Two Wins In Finals Yesterday At Sydney

SYDNEY, (CP)—Bayne Secord's Saskatchewan rink blew hot and cold Tuesday night but won an extra end 9-8 game with Ontario in the fourth round of the Dominion school bonspiel.

The win was the fourth for Saskatchewan and made Secord odds-on favorite to take the Dominion title two years in a row.

The loss was the first for Ontario and dropped them into a second place tie with Prince Edward Island and Alberta.

Prince Edward Island's Charlottetown rink defeated British Columbia 10-7 and Alberta 10-7 in an easy 16-3 win over Quebec. Quebec is tied with Northern Ontario, each with two wins and two losses. Northern Ontario lost to New Brunswick 9-7, and Nova Scotia defeated Manitoba 9-7. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia each have 1-3 records while Manitoba remains unbeaten in yet to win.

Reports Russian Hockey Team Stronger This Year

KREFELD, Germany, (AP)—Pavel Korotkov, the leader of all hockey played in Russia, said Tuesday that the Soviet team entered in the world championships starting Friday is stronger than last year's team which defeated Canada for the title.

Korotkov also conceded that the Canadians are "infinitely stronger."

The Russian, speaking in a friendly manner during an interview, said he expects the championships to be decided among five countries—Russia, Canada, the United States, Sweden and Czechoslovakia. "They are the strongest and have equal chances," he said.
