Lord Astor, member of the millionaire Anglo-American Waldorf Astor family and a central figure in the 1963 Profumo scandal, died in The Bahamas Monday night of a heart attack. Lord Astor, the third viscount, was 59. He had flown to Nassau, capital of The Bahamas, Saturday for a month's vacation. His wife, the former London model Bronwen Pugh, was in Nassau with him.
