

Repossession Of Dragger Is Supported

Fisheries Minister Leo Rostler said Wednesday that he agrees with the decision of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Loan Board to repossess the Souris dragger "Irene R."

"The rules were broken," said Mr. Rostler, "and the board was entirely in its rights in the action it took."

The broken rule consisted of landing catches at ports other than Souris which is contrary to the contract between the board and the "Irene R."

Patients Enjoy Cup Parade

Wage Order To Be Drafted

It is expected that within 10 days the provincial labor relations board will have an order drafted that will recommend a minimum wage for men in the province.

Board chairman, C. R. McQuaid, said Wednesday that the board has completed its preliminary studies of a minimum wage and will draft an order for Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge. Mr. Wedge will pass the board's recommendation along to the executive council for consideration.

On Aug. 13, the executive council approved an order setting a minimum wage of \$11 per hour for men in the Charlottetown and Summerside areas.

Plant Site Not Chosen

Plans and specifications for new cold storage facilities in the Charlottetown area are under consideration by the P. E. I. Industrial Corporation, Leo Rostler, minister of industry and natural resources, said Wednesday.

Mr. Rostler said that the corporation has several sites in mind but has not chosen one as yet. "We want to build near an industrial area," he said.

For some time, the government has been planning to build cold storage facilities to reduce the present government plant on Fisher Street which is inadequate for storage.

According to Mr. Rostler, the facilities will be built under the direction of the P. E. I. Industrial Corporation, a government company.

Fortune Head Man Is Fined

Lloyd MacKinnon, Fortune Head, charged with drunken driving, pleaded guilty to the lesser count of impaired driving and was fined \$125 and costs or 30 days in city police court Wednesday. Magistrate A. J. Healey presided.

was the guest soloist at the evening worship service in the Kingsboro United Baptist Church.

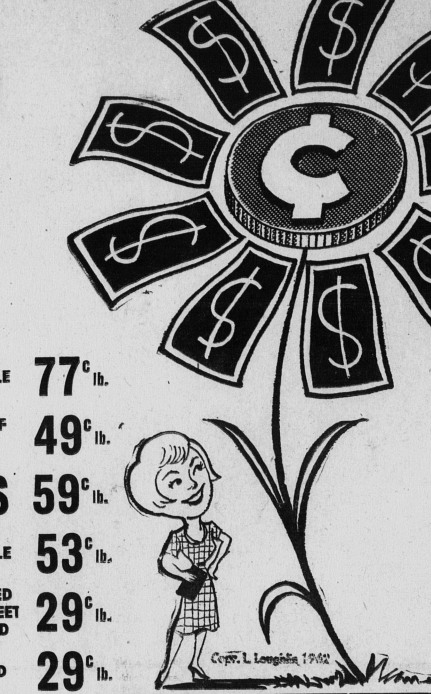
Mrs. George Bruce, Kingsboro, has entered the Souris Hospital for treatment.
